God's Promises in 2 King

- 1. In chapter 1, God sends a message to King Ahaziah through Elijah the prophet, warning him of his impending death. Ahaziah disregards the warning and dies as prophesied (2 Kings 1:16-17).
- 2. In chapter 2, Elijah is taken up to heaven in a whirlwind, and his successor Elisha receives a double portion of Elijah's spirit (2 Kings 2:11-14).
- 3. In chapter 3, God provides water for the armies of Israel, Judah, and Edom during a time of drought and delivers them from their enemies (2 Kings 3:16-19, 22-24).
- 4. In chapter 4, God performs several miracles through Elisha, including providing oil for a widow in debt (2 Kings 4:1-7), resurrecting a Shunammite woman's son (2 Kings 4:32-37), and purifying a pot of stew (2 Kings 4:38-41).
- 5. In chapter 5, God heals the Syrian commander Naaman of leprosy through Elisha's instructions (2 Kings 5:1-14).
- 6. Protection from enemies: "Don't be afraid," the prophet answered. "Those who are with us are more than those who are with them." (2 Kings 6:16)
- 7. Divine guidance and wisdom: Elisha prayed, "Open his eyes, LORD, so that he may see." Then the LORD opened the servant's eyes, and he looked and saw the hills full of horses and chariots of fire all around Elisha. (2 Kings 6:17)
- 8. Divine deliverance: But if you wait until daylight, punishment will overtake you. Go, tell him this.' " (2 Kings 7:9)
- 9. Restoration of prosperity: "About this time tomorrow, a seah of the finest flour will sell for a shekel and two seahs of barley for a shekel at the gate of Samaria." (2 Kings 7:18)
- 10. Preservation of a remnant: Yet I will leave seven thousand in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal, and every mouth that has not kissed him. (2 Kings 19:18)
- 11. Fulfillment of prophecies: "See, I will send the prophet Elijah to you before that great and dreadful day of the LORD comes. He will turn the hearts of the parents to their children, and the hearts of the children to their parents; or else I will come and strike the land with total destruction." (2 Kings 4:5-6)

- 12. Preservation of a faithful remnant: Nevertheless, for the sake of his servant David, the LORD was not willing to destroy Judah. He had promised to maintain a lamp for David and his descendants forever. (2 Kings 8:19)
- 13. Protection from enemies: "Do not be afraid," the prophet answered. "Those who are with us are more than those who are with them." (2 Kings 6:16)
- 14. Restoration of a king from the line of David: This is what the LORD says: 'I will appoint over you the man you are seeking—Jehu son of Nimshi. (2 Kings 9:6)
- 15. Judgment for disobedience: "Because this nation has rejected the covenant of the LORD, which he made with their ancestors, and has not obeyed his voice or walked in accordance with it, therefore this calamity has come upon them." (2 Kings 17:15)
- 16. Forgiveness for repentance: The LORD warned Israel and Judah through all his prophets and seers: "Turn from your evil ways. Observe my commands and decrees, in accordance with the entire Law that I commanded your ancestors to obey and that I delivered to you through my servants the prophets." (2 Kings 17:13)
- 17. The fulfillment of prophetic promises: "This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: I anointed you king over Israel, and you destroyed the house of Ahab, your master, and I will avenge the blood of my servants the prophets and the blood of all the LORD's servants shed by Jezebel." (2 Kings 9:7)
- 18. Protection from enemies: Thus says the Lord God of Israel: 'Behold, I am bringing such a disaster upon Jerusalem and Judah, that whoever hears of it, both his ears will tingle. And I will stretch over Jerusalem the measuring line of Samaria and the plummet of the house of Ahab; I will wipe Jerusalem as one wipes a dish, wiping it and turning it upside down. So it shall be in that day that I will seek to destroy the wise men from Edom, and understanding from the mountains of Esau.' (2 Kings 21:12-14)
- 19. God's mercy towards those who repent: Then Manasseh knew that the Lord was God. (2 Kings 21:17)
- 20. Protection of His faithful servants: Then Isaiah the son of Amoz sent to Hezekiah, saying, "Thus says the Lord God of Israel: 'Because you have prayed to Me against Sennacherib king of Assyria, I have heard.' (2 Kings 19:20)
- 21. Fulfillment of prophetic promises: "This is what the Lord says: I am going to bring disaster on this place and its people, according to everything written in the book the king of Judah has read. Because they have forsaken me and burned incense to other gods and aroused my anger by all the idols their hands have made, my anger will burn against this place and will not be quenched." (2 Kings 22:16-17)
- 22. God's provision and protection for His people: But if you say to me, "We are trusting in the Lord our God!" -isn't he the one who was insulted by Hezekiah? Didn't he cut off the flow of the Egyptian River and dry up the water from deep wells? (2 Kings 18:22)
- 23. God's faithfulness to His covenant with David: Nevertheless, for the sake of David, the Lord his God gave him a lamp in Jerusalem by raising up a son to succeed him and by making Jerusalem strong. (2 Kings 8:19)

- 24. Judgment for disobedience: "Therefore this is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: I am going to bring such disaster on Jerusalem and Judah that the ears of everyone who hears of it will tingle." (2 Kings 21:12)
- 25. God's mercy towards those who repent: "Because your heart was responsive and you humbled yourself before the Lord when you heard what I have spoken against this place and its people—that they would become a curse and be laid waste—and because you tore your robes and wept in my presence, I also have heard you, declares the Lord." (2 Kings 22:19)
- 26. God's protection for His people: "Therefore this is what the Lord says concerning the king of Assyria: 'He will not enter this city or shoot an arrow here. He will not come before it with shield or build a siege ramp against it. By the way that he came he will return; he will not enter this city, declares the Lord. I will defend this city and save it, for my sake and for the sake of David my servant!" (2 Kings 19:32-34)
- 27. Fulfillment of prophetic promises: "The Lord warned Israel and Judah through all his prophets and seers: 'Turn from your evil ways. Observe my commands and decrees, in accordance with the entire Law that I commanded your ancestors to obey and that I delivered to you through my servants the prophets." (2 Kings 17:13)
- 28. God's provision for His people in exile: "Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat their produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease." (2 Kings 25:27-28)
