Be honest and upright

In 1 Kings 9, Solomon completes his building work, including temples, royal palaces, and other important buildings. God again appeared to Solomon and told him that as long as he kept God's commandments and ordinances, his kingdom would remain prosperous and prominent. However, if he or his descendants leave the ways of God, their nation will be destroyed and dispossessed. God also assured Solomon that his name would forever be associated with the temple and that he would dwell there, protecting and blessing the Israelites as long as they obeyed his laws and commands.

King Solomon was one of Israel's preeminent kings in history, and was praised for his wisdom and achievements in building the temple. However, even such a wise king is not exempt from making mistakes. In the Bible account, we see that King Solomon was not perfect, and that some of his actions deviated from God's will.

First, marry a foreign wife and embrace paganism (9:24)

King Solomon followed many foreign wives and tolerated their worship of pagan idols, which was contrary to God's command. God had warned the Israelites not to marry people from other nations because their beliefs and customs would cause the Israelites to turn away from the true God. However, King Solomon did not listen to God, which led to himself and the nation stray from God's ways.

King Solomon's addiction to worldly pleasures and power led him to turn his heart away from God. He built ornate palaces and temples in pursuit of worldly glory and wealth, but neglected obedience and reverence for God. Despite his extraordinary wisdom and building power, King Solomon also made the grave mistake of not obeying God's Word. His story reminds us that even the wisest and most powerful people can be lost, and true wisdom and blessings can only be attained by humility and obedience to God's will.

Be honest and upright

David was not a perfect man who sinned many times throughout his life. But he was "honest in heart" (Psalm 50:6) and immediately obeyed and repented of his sins as soon as he was enlightened by the Holy Spirit (Psalm 51:7–9). and confess his unworthiness, "calling blessed are those who are reckoned righteous by God apart from works" (Romans 4:6). Therefore, God still commends David for "walking before me in truth and uprightness."

Maintaining honesty and integrity is a vital part of the Christian life because it reflects our obedience to God and respect for others. An honest and upright heart means that we remain truthful and impartial at all times, no matter what temptations or difficulties we face.

First, an honest and upright heart is built on trust and fear of God. We believe that God is the source of truth, and He asks us to follow His ways, in harmony with His truth. Therefore, our actions and words should be consistent with God's teachings, both in private and in public.

Second, an honest and upright heart shapes our relationships with others. By being honest and upright, we build trust and respect, which are the cornerstones of healthy relationships. 1 Kings 9

- 9:1 Solomon built the house of Yahohua and the royal palace, and finished all that he wished.
- 9:2 And Jehovah appeared to Solomon twice, as he had appeared to him at Gibeon,
- 9:3 And said unto him, Whatever thou hast prayed unto me, I have answered. I have sanctified this temple which you have built, that my name will be in it forever. and my eyes and my heart will always be there.
- 9:4 If thou wilt follow the example of thy Father David and walk before me with sincerity and uprightness, and do all that I command thee, and keep my statutes and ordinances,
- 9:5 I will establish your kingdom in Israel unto eternity, just as I should have said to your father David that your children will never be seated in Israel.
- 9:6 But if you and your children turn away from following me, and do not keep the commandments and statutes which I have commanded you, and serve and worship other gods,
- 9:7 Then I will cut off the Israelites from the land which I have given them, and I will forsake the temple which I have set apart for my name, and the Israelites will be mocked and conspired against among all the peoples.
- 9:8 And though this house be very high, they that pass by shall be astonished, and will laugh, and say, Why did Yahweh do this to this land and this house?
- 9:9 They will answer that it is because the people of this land have forsaken their gods, who brought their fathers out of the land of Egypt, Yahweh and their gods, and have come near to other gods, and have served and worshipped them, wherefore Jehovah hath brought upon them all this calamity.
- 9:10 Solomon built the temple and the palace of Yahohua, which took 20 years to complete.

- 9:11 (Hiram king of Tyre provided him with cedar wood, pine wood, and gold, as Solomon had requested) King Solomon gave Greece twenty cities in the land of Galilee.
- 9:12 When Hiram came out of Tyre and looked at the cities that Solomon had given him, he was not pleased.
- 9:13 And he said, My brother, what town hast thou given me? And he called the name of the place of this city Capulech, and he continues to this day.
- 9:14 And Hiram gave Solomon a hundred and twenty talents of gold.
- 9:15 King Solomon chose the obedient men to build the house of Yahweh, and his own house, and Mero, and the walls of Jerusalem, and Sham, and Megiddo, and the colors.
- 9:16 Pharaoh, king of Egypt, came up and took Ges, burned them with fire, and slew the Canaanites who lived in the city, and gave the city to the wife of his daughter, Lomon.
- 9:17 Solomon building the base of the building, Beth-Horam,
- 9:18 Barak and Damo in the wilderness of the kingdom,
- 9:19 and built all the cities of the store, and the cities of the wagons and the horses, and Jerusalem, and Lebanon, and all the kingdom which he ruled as he wished.
- 9:20 As for the remaining Amorites, the Hittites, the Bilizites, the Grevites, and the Jebusites, who were not Israelites in the land,
