- 2 Kings 2:1 And Jehohua shall take the time of Israel's ascension into heaven by a whirlwind, and Elijah and Elisha shall go from Gilgal.
- 2:2 And Elijah said unto Elishah, Yahweh sent me to Bethel, and thou shalt wait here. And Elisha said, As of the living Jehovah, I dare to swear before thee, that I will not depart from thee. So the two went down to Bethel.
- 2:3 And the disciples of the prophets who lived in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said unto him, Yahweh will take thy master away from thee this day, and thou knowest not the way. He said, "I know that you don't have to be silent.
- 2:4 And Israel said unto Elishah, Jehovah hath sent me to Jerego, and thou shalt wait here. And Elisha said, As of the living Jehovah, I dare to swear before thee, that I will not depart from thee. So they went to Jericho.
- 2:5 And the prophetic disciples who lived in Jericho came near Elisha and said unto him, Yahweh will take thy master away from thee this day, and thou knowest not. He said, "I know that you don't have to be silent.
- 2:6 And Israel said unto Elishah, Yahweh hath sent me to the Jordan, and thou shalt wait here. And Elisha said, As of the living Jehovah, I dare to swear before thee, that I will not depart from thee. So the two of them went together.
- 2:7 Fifty of the Prophet's disciples went and stood afar across from them. The two of them took up their place by the Jordan River.
- 2:8 Eliah rolled up his cloak and used it to draw water, and the water was divided to the right and left, and the two walked on dry ground.

- 2:9 And it came to pass, after that Elijah said unto Elisha, I have not been taken away from thee: but beg me what thou wilt thou do for thee. Elisha said, "Let your spirit move me doubly."
- 2:10 And Elijah said, Thou hast asked for a hard time. Nevertheless, when I am taken away from you, if you see me, you will find me. if not, it will not be possible.
- 2:11 While they were talking, a chariot and a horse separated them, and Eliah ascended to heaven in a whirlwind.
- 2:12 When Elisha saw it, he cried out, "My father." My father. O chariots and horsemen of Israel. never to see him again. So Elisha tore his garment into two pieces.
- 2:13 He picked up the cloak that had fallen off Elijah's body and went back to stand by the Jordan River.
- 2:14 And he drew water with the cloak that had fallen off Eliah, and said, Where is the God of Yahweh, and Elijah? After the water was drawn, the water was also parted to the right and left, and Elisha came over.
- 2:15 When the prophet disciples who lived in Jericho saw him from the opposite side, they said, "Elisha's spirit has been moved by Elia." And they came to meet him, and fell on their faces before him,
- 2:16 And said unto him, Servants, there are fifty and ten mighty men here: let them go and seek thy master, or the spirit of Yahweh hawah hath lifted him up and cast him into such a mountain or a valley. And Elisha said, Thou shalt not send any man.
- 2:17 They urged him again and again, but he could not refuse, so he said, "Send someone to do so." So they sent fifty men and searched for three days, but they found nothing.
- 2:18 Elisha was still waiting in Jericho for them to return to him. And he said unto them, Did I not tell you that ye must not go?
- 2:19 And the men of the city of Jericho said unto Elisha, The land of this city is good, and my lord has seen it. it is just that the water is bad and the soil is not ripe and falls.

- 2:20 And Elisha said, Bring me a new jar and fill it with salt. And they brought it to him.
- 2:21 And he went forth to the fountain of water, and poured salt into the water, and said, Thus saith the Lord, I have healed this water, and from now on shall no more cause death to man, nor shall the earth no longer produce.
- 2:22 So the water was healed, and to this day, as Elisha had said.
- Elisha went up to Bethel from there, and while he was going up, some of the lads came out of the city, and laughed at him, saying, "Go up bald." Go up bald.
- 2:24 When he looked back, he cursed them in the name of Yahweh. So two she-bears came out of the forest and tore apart forty-two of them.
- 2:25 Elisha went up from Bethel to Mount Carmel, and from Mount Carmel back to Samaria.
- 2 Kings chapter 2 describes Elijah's earthly reception into heaven and his successor Elisha receiving God's inspiration.

First, knowing that Elijah was dying, he ordered his assistant Elisha to stay while he himself went to Bethel. There, by God's will, Elijah was taken up into heaven by God, and his clothes fell on Elisha.

Elisha succeeded Elijah as a prophet and servant of God. He demonstrated God's powers, such as healing water sources in Jericho, cursing and punishing the children who mocked him, and defeating the Syrians at Mount Gilead.
