Trust Jehovah in good times and bad

2 Kings 20

2 Kings 20 continues the story of Hezekiah, king of Judah. Hezekiah was sick and on the verge of death, but he prayed to the Lord and was given an additional 15 years of life. The prophet Isaiah instructed him to put his affairs in order, and Hezekiah asked for a miracle to confirm that he would recover.

Isaiah asked Hezekiah to choose between two signs: the shadow on the sundial could move ten steps forward or ten steps backward. Hezekiah chose to let the shadow take ten steps back, and it miraculously did.

After this omen, Hezekiah flaunted his wealth to some of the Babylonian messengers, and Isaiah prophesied that the Babylonians would eventually come and take everything, including some of Hezekiah's own descendants. However, Hezekiah did not seem to care too much and instead thanked him for the peace and security of his lifetime. Chapter 20 also describes the water tunnel built by Hezekiah in Jerusalem to bring water into the city during the siege. This tunnel was discovered in modern times and is known as the Hezekiah Tunnel or the Siloam Tunnel.

2 Kings 20 emphasizes the power of prayer and the Lord's faith in those who trust in Him. However, it also foreshadowed the decline of Judah and the eventual conquest of Jerusalem by the Babylonians.

The little story of Hezekiah seems to tell two different Hezekiahs. In the first story, Hezekiah was seriously ill, but he respectfully came to Jehovah and cried out, and was eventually extended to 15 years. In the second story, when Hezekiah was cured of his illness and the kingdom of Babylon came to seek unity, Hezekiah seemed desperate to get an alliance with Babylon and show off his wealth to an angel of Babylon, and the entire palace of Judah was looked at, which Jehovah did not like.

Why is Hezekiah in the two stories of today very confident and the other less confident? When Hezekiah was seriously ill, he had to rely on Jehovah, so he came to God and prayed sincerely, and he had no way but to rely on God! In the second story, Hezekiah was cured of his illness and had strength, so he used his own diplomatic means to solve the problem, and when he was on himself, he did not rely on God

This chapter tells us that God's children should trust God and walk the path of faith, no matter what the circumstances, and never think that because we are successful, we don't need to rely on God.

There are many passages in the Bible that encourage us to trust in God. Here are some verses related to trusting God:

Psalm 37:5

"Trust ye Hohua with all your heart, and do not trust in your own wisdom, but establish him in all thy ways, and he shall direct thy paths. _

Proverbs 3:5-6

"Rely on Yahweh with all your heart, and do not trust in your own wisdom. Recognize Him in all your ways, and He will direct your paths. _

Isaiah 41:10

"Do not be afraid, for I am with you, and do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, I will help you, and I will sustain you with my righteous right hand. \[\]

Matthew 6:31-33

2 Kings 20

- 20:1 At that time, the Greek family was so sick that it was dying. And the prophet Isaiah the son of Amoz went to him, and said unto him, Thus saith Jehovah, Thou shalt leave thy life with thy house, for thou shalt surely die, and thou shalt not live.
- Then Hezekiah turned his face to the wall and prayed to Jehovah, saying,
- 20:3 Remember, Yahweh, how I have kept a perfect heart before you, and have done what is good in your sight. The Greek family wept bitterly.
- When Isaiah came out, and had not yet come to the middle court, the word of Yahweh came to him, saying,
- 20:5 Go back to Hezekiah, the king of my people, and say, Thus saith the God of David thy father, 'I have heard thy prayer, and have seen thy tears, and I will heal thee.' And it shall come to pass on the third day, that thou shalt go up to the house of Jehovah.
- 20:6 I will increase your life of fifteen years, and I will deliver you and this city out of the hand of the king of Assyria. I will protect this city for my own sake, and for the sake of my servant David.
- 20:7 Isaiah said, take a piece of cake without a figflower. And they took it and put it on it, and the king was healed.
- 20:8 Hezekiah said to Isaiah, "Yahweh shall heal me, and on the third day I will go up to the house of Yahweh, what sign shall I have?"
- 20:9 Isaiah said, Yahweh will do what he says. this is a sign he gives you, do you want the shadow of the sun to move forward ten degrees? is it going to go back ten degrees?
- 20:10 The Greek family replied, "It is easy for the sun to move forward ten degrees, and I want the sun to go back ten degrees."
- 20:11 The prophet called on Yahovah with Isaiah, and Yahweh caused Ahaz's sundial to go back ten degrees from the shadow of the sun.
- 20:12 At that time, Bilodabarat, the son of Baradan king of Babylon, heard that Hezekiah had recovered from his illness and sent him letters and gifts.

- And when Hezekiah heard the words of the messenger, he showed them the gold, and the silver, and the incense, and the precious anointing oil, and all the weapons of his arsenal, and all the treasures of his treasures. In his home and in his whole country, the Greeks did not give them the same thing.
- 20:14 So Isaiah the prophet came to King Hezekiah and asked him, "What are these men?" Where do they come from to see you? The Greeks said they came from distant Babylon.
- 20:15 Isaiah said, what did they see in your house. Hezekiah said, "All that is in my house they have seen it." There is nothing in my treasure that I will not show them.
- 20:16 And Isaiah said unto Hezekiah, Hear the words of Jehovah,
- And the day shall come when all that is in thy house, and that which thy fathers have stored up unto this day, shall be carried away captive to Babylon, and shall be left behind. this is what ye and hua said.
- 20:18 And among the sons born of thyself shall be carried away captive to be eunuchs in the palace of Babylon.
- 20:19 Greece said to Israel, what you said about Yahweh is very good. Wouldn't it be nice if there was peace and stability in my life?
- 20:20 The rest of the Greek family, and his might, how he dug cisterns, and dug waters, and brought water into the city, are not written in the book of the kings of Juda.
- 20:21 Hezekiah slept with his fathers. And his son Manasseh succeeded him as king.

This shows God's knowledge of future events and His ability to reveal them through His prophets. It reminds us that God sees the bigger picture and knows the results of our actions. It prompts us to seek His wisdom and guidance in our decisions, knowing that He has a perfect understanding of the future.
