Humble yourself and obey God

Kings write down 2 chapter 5

Chapter 5 tells the story of the Syrian general Naaman who fell ill with leprosy and traveled to Israel to seek treatment when he heard that the Israeli prophet Elisha could cure the disease. Naaman came to Elisha's door, but Elisha did not come out to meet him personally, but sent a servant to tell him that he would be healed by washing the Jordan seven times. Naaman was dissatisfied, believing that such a simple treatment was not enough to cure his condition. However, under the persuasion of his entourage, he finally decided to follow Elisha's instructions, and his illness was miraculously cured.

Naaman was grateful for Elisha's healing and wanted to return the favor as a token of gratitude, but Elisha rejected his gift, insisting that only God was the true healer. However, Elisha's servant Gehazi privately pursued Naaman and asked for some gifts from him. Naaman generously gave Gehazi some silver, gold, and clothing, but Kehazi was accused of this by Elisha, who considered his actions unfaithful, and Gehazi's body was infected with the leprosy that Naaman had suffered.

2 Kings 5

- 5:1 Naaman, the captain of the army of the king of Syria, was exalted and exalted in the presence of his lord, for Yahweh had brought victory over the Syrians through him. he was a mighty warrior, but he grew up to be a leprosy.
- 5:2 The Syrians went out in large groups, and took captive from the countries of Israel a little girl, who served Nai's wife.
- 5:3 She said to her mistress, "If my lord does not go to the prophet of Samaria, he will be cured of his great insanity."
- 5:4 Naaman went in and told his master, "Thus is what the daughters of the Israelination say."
- 5:5 And the king of Syria said, Go, and I will trust the king of Israel. So Naaman took ten talents of silver, six thousand shekels of gold, and ten sets of clothes, and departed.
- 5:6 And he brought a letter to the king of Israel, saying, "I have sent my servant Nai to see you, and when you receive this letter, you will be cured of his great insufficiency."
- 5:7 When the king of Israel saw the faith, he tore his garments and said, "Am I God, able to make a man die and a man live?" But this man sent a man to cure him of his great insufficiency. Look at it, why is this man looking for a gap against me?

- 5:8 When Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his garment, he sent them to the king, saying, Why hast thou torn thy garment? But when the man came to me, he knew that there was a prophet in Israel.
- 5:9 So Naireen took the chariot and the horse to Elisha's house and stood before the door.
- 5:10 Elisha sent a messenger and said to Naimu, "Go and bathe in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh will be restored and purified."
- 5:11 But Naaman went away in anger, saying, "I think he will surely come out to me, and stand and call on the name of the god Yahvathah, and shake his hand over the affliction, and heal this great leprosy."
- 5:12 Are not the rivers of Damascus and Pharyphat better than all the water of Israel? Can't I bathe in there be clean? So he turned away angrily.
- 5:13 And his servants came unto him, and said unto him, My Father, if the prophet had commanded thee to do a great thing, wouldnt thou not do it? What can you say that you go to the bath and be clean?
- 5:14 So Naaman went down and bathed in the Jordan seven times, according to the word of the man of God. His flesh was restored like the flesh of a child, and he was clean.
- 5:15 And Naaman returned to the man of God with all those who were with him, and stood before him, and said, Now I know that there is no god in the world except Israel. Now I beg you to receive some of the gifts of your servants.
- 5:16 And Elisha said, By Jehovah, whom I serve, I will not accept it. Naaman begged him again and again, but he did not accept it.
- 5:17 And Nai said, If thou wilt not accept it, give thy servant the soil that two mules packed. From now on, the servant will no longer offer burnt offerings or peace offerings to other gods, but to Yahweh.
- 5:18 But one thing, may the Lord forgive your servant, when my master came into the temple and bowed down, I took him by the hand in the temple, and I bowed down. I bowed down in the Linmen temple and may Yahweh and Hua forgive me.
- 5:19 And Elisha said unto him, Thou shalt return in peace. And Naaman departed from him. walked not far,
- 5:20 And Gehazi, the servant of Elisha, the man of God, said in his heart, "My lord will not receive the gift from the hand of this Syrian Naaman that he has brought: I swear by Jehovah, who lives, that I will run after him and ask him for something."
- 5:21 So Kihazi pursued Naaman. Naaman saw that someone was chasing after him, so he hurriedly got out of the car and met him, and said, Are you all safe?

- 5:22 said, all are safe. My master sent me to say that there were just two young men, disciples of the Prophets, who had come to me from the mountains of Ephraim, and asked them to give them silver and two sets of clothes.
- 5:23 Naaman said, "Please accept two of them." After repeated requests, he put two silver in two pockets, and handed over two sets of clothes to two servants. They walked with their heads held high in front of Kihasi.
- 5:24 When they arrived at the hills, Kihasi took them from them, put them in the house, and sent them back.
- 5:25 Kihazi went in and stood before his master. Elisha asked him, "Kihazi where you come from?" He replied that the servant had not gone anywhere.
- 5:26 Elisha said to him, "When the man got out of his chariot and turned back to meet you, didn't my heart go?" Is it the time of the money, and the garments, and the olive groves, and the vineyards, and the sheep and cattle, and the servants and maidservants?
- 5:27 Therefore the great leprosy of Naaman shall defile thee and thy seed for ever. And when Gehazi withdrew from the face of Elisha, he grew into great leprosy, as white as snow.
- 2 Kings 5 tells the story of Naaman, the commander of the army of the king of Syria, who was cured of leprosy with the intervention of the prophet Elisha. When Naaman heard that Elisha was a healer, he went to Israel with gifts to seek a cure for Elisha's leprosy. When Naaman came to Elisha's house, Elisha didn't even come out to meet him, but sent a message to Naaman asking him to go to the Jordan River seven times to wash. Naaman was angry because Elisha did not come out to see him, and he was told to bathe in the Jordan River, which he considered inferior to his homeland. Eventually, however, Naaman followed Elisha's instructions and was cured of leprosy. Naaman returned to Elisha to thank him and give him a gift, but Elisha rejected the gift, saying that Naaman's healing was a gift from God, not a gift from Elisha. However, Elisha's servant Gehazi took Elisha behind his back and asked Naim for a gift. Naaman happily gave him two pieces of silver and two sets of clothes, but when Gehazi returned to Elisha's house, Elisha asked him if the healing was for sale. The story of Nai's healing highlights God's ability to heal the most serious ailments, as well as the importance of humility and obedience in receiving God's blessings. It also shows the contrast between Naaman's faith and obedience and Gehazi's greed and deceit.

It reminds us that true healing and conversion often require us to humble ourselves before God and submit to His guidance.

God's Inclusive Salvation: Naaman's healing highlights the inclusiveness of God's salvation. Naaman, a foreigner and enemy commander, was healed and encountered the power of the true God. This shows that God's grace and salvation transcend the boundaries of nationality, race, and social status. It reminds us that God's love and redemption are available to all who seek Him, regardless of their background.

True Worship and Devotion: After experiencing healing, Naaman acknowledged the God of Israel as the only true God and expressed his desire to worship Him. However, Naaman also asked for permission to bring the soil of Israel back to Syria so that he could sacrifice on it. This

shows that Naaman understands the importance of worshipping God in a proper manner and with a sincere heart. It emphasizes the importance of true worship and devotion to God, acknowledging Him as a source of true healing and salvation.
