7:1 And Elishah said, Hear ye unto the words of Jehovah, thus saith Jehovah, Tomorrow about this time a seath-seam of fine flour shall sell for a shekel of silver at the gate of the city of Samaria, and for a shekel of silver for the barley of two seahs.

- 7:2 And one of the captains of the army who supported the king said to the man of God, Even if Benje and Hohua had opened the windows of heaven, this could not have happened. And Elisha said, Thou shalt see with thy eyes, but thou shalt not eat.
- 7:3 And there were four very lepers at the gates, and they said to them, Why do we sit here and die?
- 7:4 If we say, Go into the city. There is a famine in the city, and you will die there. If you sit still here, you will die. Come, let us go and surrender the armies of the Aramans, and if they leave us alive, they will live. if you kill us, you will die.
- 7:5 And at dusk they arose and went to the camp of the Syrians. When they came to the camp, they saw not a single person there.
- 7:6 for the armies of the Lord of the Syrians heard the sound of chariots and horses, the voice of the great army. And they said unto him, It must be the kings of Israel who bribed the kings of the Hittites and the kings of the Egyptians against us.
- 7:7 Therefore at dusk they got up and fled, leaving their tents, horses, and donkeys, and the camp as before, fleeing for their lives.
- 7:8 And the lepers came to the camp, and went into the tents, and ate and drank, and took out of them silver and gold, and garments, and hid them. Then he went into another tent, and took out of it the goods, and went and hid them.
- 7:9 At that time, they said that what we had done was not good. Today is a day of good news, and we are silent. But if we wait until dawn, sin will come upon us. Come, let's report to the royal family.
- 7:10 So they went and called the gatekeepers, and told them, "When we came to the camp of the Syrians, we saw not a man there, nor was there any sound, but horses and asses on a leash, and the tents were as they were."
- 7:11 And the gatekeepers called all the gatekeepers, and they went in and told the king.
- 7:12 And the king arose in the night, and said unto his servants, I tell you what the Syrians have done unto us. And they knew that we were hungry, so they

left the camp and lay in wait in the fields, saying, When the Israelites go out of the city, we will capture them alive and enter the city.

- 7:13 And one of his servants said unto the king, Let us not send a spy on us with five of the horses that are left in the city, which are the same as the Israelites left in the city, and are about to be destroyed.
- 7:14 So he took two chariots and horses, and the king sent after the Arams, saying, Go and spy out.
- 7:15 So they traced the Jordan River, and when they saw that the roads were full of clothes and utensils that the Syrians had discarded during their hurry, they returned to the king.
- 7:16 And they went out, and carried out the camp of the Syrians. So a thin asiatic flour sold for a shekel, and a second seam for a shekel of silver, just as Jehohua had said.
- 7:17 And the captain of the army whom the king had sent to support him was crushed at the gate of the city, and they trampled him down there, and he died, just as the man of God had said when he came to the king.
- 7:18 The man of God said to the king, "Tomorrow about this time will sell two seashes of barley for silver at the gate of Samaria, and a seaor of fine flour for a shekel of silver."
- 7:19 And the captain said unto the man of God, Even if Benje and Hohwa had opened the windows of heaven, there could be no such thing. And the man of God said, Thou shalt see with thy eyes, but thou shalt not eat.
- 7:20 Sure enough, it came true to him. for they had trodden him under foot at the gates, and he died.
