Do not be deceived, for God cannot be mocked

2 Kings No. 9

2 Kings 9 tells the story of Jehu, who was anointed king of Israel by Elisha's disciple, a prophet, by God's command. Jehu was tasked with carrying out God's judgment on the wicked King Ahab and his wicked wife Jezebel, who had brought the Israelites into the orbit of idolatry.

Jehu wasted no time and immediately set out for Jezreel, where he confronted Jehoram king of Israel, Ahab's son. Joram asked Jehu if he had come safely, and Jehu replied that there would be no peace while Jezebel lived. Joram tried to escape, but Jehu shot him with an arrow.

Jehu then went to Jezreel, where Jezebel lived. When Jezebel saw Jehu, he laughed at him and asked him if he had come to kill her, just as he had killed her son. Jehu responded by calling on the eunuch to throw her down from the window, and they did. Jezebel's body was trampled by a horse, fulfilling the prophecy that the dogs would devour her flesh in the fields of Jezreel.

Gal 6:7,8 Do not be deceived, for God cannot be mocked. What man sows, he reaps. 8He that sooweth according to the flesh shall reap corruption from the lust, and he that sow according to the Spirit shall reap eternal life from the Spirit ...

God's Word does not fail in great things, nor does it fail in small things. Jehu was well aware of Elijah's prophecy about Jezebel, and Jezebel himself should have known it well. But she didn't take God's word to heart at all, and continued to be arrogant and go her own way, and ended up being eaten by dogs.

Do not deceive yourself that God is mocked

2 Kings 9

9:1 And Elisha the prophet called one of the prophet's disciples, and said unto him, Gird up thy loins, and take this jar of anointing in thy hand, and go to Ramoth-gilead.

- 9:2 And when he came there, thou shalt seek Jehu, the son of Jehoshaphat, the son of Nimshi, and bring him out of his fellow workers, and bring him into a tight house.
- 9:3 And he poured the oil out of the jar upon his head, and said, Thus saith the Yahwehweh, I have anointed thee king of Israel. when he was done, he opened the door and ran away without delay.
- 9:4 So the young prophet went to Ramoth-gilead.
- 9:5 When he got there, he saw all the army commanders sitting, and he said, "General, I have something to say to you." And Jehu said, Which of us shall thou say unto whom? and replied, "O general, I will say unto thee."
- 9:6 And Jehu arose, and went into the house, and the young men poured anointing oil upon his head, and said unto him, Thus saith the God of Jehova and Israel, I have anointed thee king over Jereah and Israel of the people of China.
- 9:7 Thou shalt smite all the house of Ahab thy master, that I may avenge the blood shed by all the prophets of my servants and all the servants of Jehovah on Jezebel.
- 9:8 and all the house of Ahab shall perish, and all the males of Ahab shall be trapped and free, and I will cut off from Israel.
- 9:9 And he made the house of Ahab like the house of Jeroboam the son of Nebat, and like the house of Baasha the son of Ahiah.
- 9:10 Jezebel shall be eaten by dogs in the field of Jezreel, and there shall be no one to bury him. after saying that, the young man opened the door and ran away.
- 9:11 When Jehu came out to his master's servants, one of them asked him, "Are you at peace?" What is the matter with this arrogant man coming to you? And he replied, Thou knowest the man, and know what he said.
- 9:12 They say it's a lie, and you tell us the truth. He replied that he said this to me . And he said, Thus saith the Jews, I have anointed thee king over Israel.
- 9:13 And they made haste, and spread out their garments on the upper steps, and sat on them. And they blew their trumpets, and said, Jehu is king.

- 9:14 So Jehu, the son of Joshaphat the son of Nimshi, rebelled against Joram. First, Joram and Israel kept Ramoth-gilead because of Hazael king of Syria.
- 9:15 But King Joram returned to Jezreel to heal the wounds he had wounded in battle with Hazael king of Syria. And Jehu said, If it is to your will, no one shall flee out of the city and report to Jezreel.
- 9:16 So Jehu went by chariot to Jezreel, where he lay down because of Joram's disease. King Ahaziah of Judah had gone down to see him.
- 9:17 And a watchman stood on the upper floor of Jezreel, and when he saw Jehu coming with a multitude, he said, I see a multitude. Joran said he sent a man on horseback to meet them and ask if they were safe or not.
- 9:18 And he who rode on horseback went to meet Jehu, and said, The king asked, 'Is it safe?' yehu said, peace is not peace what does it have to do with you. You turn behind me . And the watchman said that the messenger came to them, but did not return.
- 9:19 And the king sent a man on horseback. This man came to them and said, "The king asked, 'Is it safe?' yehu said, peace is not peace what does it have to do with you. You turn behind me.
- 9:20 And the watchman said that when he came to them, he would not return. The chariot drove violently, like the way of Jehu, the grandson of Nimshi.
- 9:21 joram commanded, set up the car. people gave him a car. Joram king of Israel and Ahaziah king of Judah went out in their own chariots to meet Jehu, and met him in the field of Naboth the Jezreelite.
- 9:22 When Joram saw Jehu, he said, "Is it peace, O Jehu?" And Jehu said, Thy mother Jezebel has so many fornications, how can she be at peace?
- 9:23 And Joram turned around and fled, and said unto Ahazeiah, Ahhaziah, it is the other way around.
- 9:24 Jehu filled his bow and struck Joram in the back, and the arrow went out of the heart, and Joram fell on the chariot.
- 9:25 And Jehu said unto his captain of the army, Begal, Cast him into the field of Naboth the Jezreelite. Remember, when you and I rode together in the chariot with Ahab his father, the prophecy of Yahweh to Ahab,

- 9:26 And said, I saw the blood of Naboth and the blood of his sons yesterday, and I will repay thee in this field. This is what Yahweh said, and now you will cast him in this field, as Yahweh said.
- 9:27 When Ahaziah king of Judah saw this, he fled by the way of the garden pavilion. Jehu pursued him and said, "Kill this man in the chariot as well." And when they came to the slope near Aunt Ebel, they wounded him. He fled to Megiddo, where he died.
- 9:28 His servants carried his body in a chariot to Jerusalem and buried him in his own tomb in the Acropolis, where he was buried with his fathers.
- 9:29 When Ahaziah became king of Judah, it was in the eleventh year of Jehoram the son of Ahab.
- 9:30 Jehu came to Jezreel. Jezzel did not hear it, so he wiped the powder, combed his hair, and looked out of the window.
- 9:31 When Jehu entered, Jezebel said, Is peace with the heart that slayed his master?
- 9:32 Jehu lifted up his head and looked at the window, and said, Who obeys me? Two or three eunuchs looked at him from the window.
- 9:33 Jehu said, Throw her down. They threw her down. Her blood was splattered on the wall and on the horse. so they trampled her on .
- 9:34 And Jehu went in, and ate and drank, and commanded, Burial of this cursed woman, for she is the daughter of the king.
- 9:35 So they went and buried her, and found only her skull and feet, and the palms of her hands.
- 9:36 They returned to Jehu, and Jehu said, This is what Jehohua said through his servant Eliah the Tisbiite, saying, In the field of Jezreel the dogs will eat Jezebel's flesh.
- 9:37 And the body of Jezebel shall be like dung in the field of Jezreel, so that no one can even say that it is Jezebel.
- 2 Kings 9 tells the story of Jehu, who was anointed king of Israel by Elisha's disciple, a prophet, by God's command. Jehu was tasked with carrying out God's

In 2 Kings 9, the key verses are:

Verse 6: "And he arose, and went into the house. And he poured oil upon his head, and said unto him, Thus saith the LORD God of Israel, I have anointed thee king of the LORD people, and hath anointed thee king of Israel.

Verse 20: "And the watchmen reported that he went unto them, and did not return, and drove as Jehu the son of Ninsey drove; Because he drove like crazy.

Verse 22: When Joram saw Jehu, he said, Is this peace, Jehu?' and he replied, "If only Jezebel thy mother had so much witchcraft, what peace would there be?"

These verses describe the prophet's anointing of Jehu as king of Israel and the chaos and destruction of Jehu upon his ascension to the throne. These events eventually led to the fall of the House of Ahab and the end of the Omrid dynasty of Israel. These verses can be found in 2 Kings 9:6, 20, and 22 in the Christian Bible.

In 2 Kings 9, we see the account of Jehu's anointing as king and his subsequent actions. This chapter offers a few points to think about:

God's Appointed Agents of Justice: Jehu was anointed as king of Israel by the prophets at God's command, and he was given a specific mission to judge Israel's wicked rulers. It reminds us of the importance of obedience and the serious consequences of disobedience to God's commands.

The futility of power and human ambition: Throughout the chapter, Jehu's rise is marked by violence and bloodshed. He eliminated not only Israel's evil rulers, but also the innocents who were connected to them. This narrative highlights the futility and destructiveness of human ambition and the quest for power. It is a cautionary reflection that reminds us of the dangers of letting power and ambition drive our actions without seeking God's guidance and abiding by His moral principles.

God's faithfulness to His promises: Although this chapter describes terrible events, it also reveals God's faithfulness to His promises. Jehu fulfilled the prophecy of Ahab's house, showing that God's Word would always be fulfilled. It reminds us that God's promises, whether judgments or blessings, are certain and will be fulfilled in His perfect time.

The Call to Repentance: While this chapter focuses primarily on God's judgment, it also includes a call to repentance. Jehu's actions caused fear and repentance among some, leading to the destruction of Israel's worship of Baal. This account emphasizes the importance of recognizing that we need to repent and turn to God. It reminds us that even in judgment, God provides opportunities for repentance and restoration.

Overall, 2 Kings 9 reflects on God's appointment of righteous agents, the consequences of sin and disobedience, the futility of human ambition, God's faithfulness to His promises, and his call to repentance. It calls us to consider God's righteous judgment, the importance of obedience, and the need for true repentance in our own lives.
