There is only one God in our hearts

2 Kings chapter 10 continues the story of Jehu, who has now firmly established himself as king of Israel. He continued his mission to destroy Ahab's house and end idolatry in the land.

Jehu sent a message to the officials and elders of Samaria, inviting them to join him in exterminating Baal's followers. They agreed, and Jehu came up with a plan to deceive the worshippers of Baal into gathering in their temple. Once they were all inside, Jehu ordered his soldiers to kill them all, leaving no survivors behind.

Jehu then went on to destroy the remaining followers of Baal throughout Israel, ensuring that there were no more worshippers of this false god. However, Jehu did not follow the path of the Lord that he was supposed to follow, and he continued to allow the worship of the golden calf set up by King Jeroboam.

The chapter concludes with the story of Jehu's death and his son Jehoahaz's ascension to the throne of Israel. Although Jehu was a fierce and zealous leader, he did not fully obey God's commands, and the consequences of his disobedience would eventually catch up with him and his kingdom.

For no matter how zealous a man may be for God, if he does not have a heart of obedience to God, he will end up like Jehu. Therefore the Lord Jesus said, "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter into the kingdom of heaven, but he that does the will of my Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 7:20)

When we decide to follow God's path wholeheartedly, we embark on a journey filled with faith and devotion. It is not just a superficial commitment, but a determination deeply rooted in the heart to entrust everything to the Most High.

2 Kings 10

- 10:1 Ahab had seventy sons in Samaria. Jehu wrote to Samaria and informed that the princes of Jezreel were elders and men who brought up the sons of Ahab, saying,
- 10:2 You have with your lord's sons, and chariots, and horses, and weapons, and fortified cities,
- 10:3 Upon receiving this faith, you may choose a virtuous and suitable one among your master's sons, so that he may sit in his father's place, and you may fight for your master's house.
- 10:4 But they were very afraid, and they said, "How can we stand before the two kings, if they cannot stand before him?"
- 10:5 And the ruler of the house, and the ruler of the city, and the elders, and the men who had brought up the sons, sent unto Jehu, saying, We are thy servants, and all that thou hast commanded us shall do, and we will not make any one king, but thou shalt do whatever is good as thou shalt do.

- 10:6 And Jehu wrote to them, saying, If you will be unto me, and hearken unto my voice, you will bring the heads of the sons of your lord to me to Jezreel at this time. Seventy of the king's sons dwelt in the noble families of the city where they were raised.
- 10:7 And when the faith came, they slew seventy of the king's sons, and put their heads in baskets and sent them to Jezreel Jehu.
- 10:8 And messengers came to Jehu, saying that they had sent the heads of the king's sons. And Jehu said, Let the heads be piled up in two piles at the gate of the city, and set aside until the morrow.
- 10:9 And it came to pass in the morning of the next day, that Jehu came out, and stood and said unto all the people, You are all righteous, and I have rebelled against my master, and I have slain him. but who killed these people?
- 10:10 From this it is evident that not a word of what Jehohua said about the house of Ahab was in vain, for all the words of Jehohua through his servant Eliah were fulfilled.
- 10:11 And all that remained of the house of Ahab in Jezreel, and his courtiers, and his close friends, and the priests, and Jehu were all killed, and not one was left behind.
- 10:12 Jehu arose, and went to Samaria. On the road, where the shepherds shear the wool of their sheep,
- 10:13 And he met the brethren of Ahaziah king of Judah, and said unto them, Who are you? He replied, "We are the brethren of Ahazieh, and now we go down to greet the king, and the sons of the queen mother."
- 10:14 Jehu commanded that they should be taken alive. And the men who followed them took them alive and slew them by the pit where they were shearing the sheep's wool, and there were forty-two of them, and not one of them was left behind.
- 10:15 And Jehu was travelling from there, and found Jonadad the son of Rephal, who came to meet him, and Jehu greeted him, and said unto him, Do thou treat me as I have done unto thee? Jonadad replied, Yes. And Jehu said, If so, thou wilt stretch out thy hand unto me, and he shall stretch out thy hand. Jehula got him into the car.

- 10:16 And Jehu said, Go with me, and see how zealous I am for Jehovah. so they asked him to sit in the car,
- 10:17 And when he came to Samaria, he slew all that was left of the house of Ahab in Samaria until it was utterly destroyed, just as Jehovah had said to Eliah.
- 10:18 Jehu gathered the people together and said to them that Ahab was still indifferent in his service to Baal, but Jehu was more zealous.
- Now I will offer a great sacrifice to Baal. Let all the prophets of Baal, and all the worshippers of Baal, and all the priests of Baal, come to me, and let not one be missing. Whoever does not come will not live. In doing so, Jehu was using a subterfuge to kill all the worshippers of Baal.
- 10:20 Jehu said that he would declare a strict council for Baal. So it was proclaimed.
- 10:21 Jehu sent people through the land of Israel. All those who worship Baal have come, and there is not one who does not come. They entered the temple of Baal, and the temple was full of people from the front to the back.
- 10:22 And Jehu commanded the men in charge of the garments, saying, Take out the garments, and give them to all who worship Baal. So he brought out his gown and gave it to them.
- 10:23 And Jonadab the son of Jehu and Recab went into the temple of Baal, and said to the worshippers of Baal, "Look and see, and there shall be no servants of Jehohua with you, but only those who worship Baal."
- 10:24 Jehu and Jonadab went in and offered a peace offering and a burnt offering. And Jehu first set up eighty men outside the temple, and said, "I will deliver them into your hand, and if any one escapes, whoever releases them shall pay for his life."
- 10:25 And it came to pass, when Jehu had made an end of offering the burnt offering, that he went out and commanded the guards and the captains of the army, saying, Go in and kill them, and let not one of them come out. And the guards and captains of the army slew them with their swords, and threw their bodies out, and went to the city of the temple of Baal.

- 10:26 He took out all the pillars in the temple of Baal and burned them.
- 10:27 The statue of the Baal pillar was destroyed and the temple of Baal was demolished to be used as a toilet to this day.
- 10:28 In the same way, Jehu destroyed Baal in Israel.
- 10:29 But Jehu did not leave Jeroboam the son of Nebal, who made the Israelites to sin, the golden calf of Bethel and Dan.
- 10:30 And Jehohua said unto Jehu, Because thou hast done that which is right in my eyes, and hast dealt with the house of Ahab according to my heart, thy children shall sit in thy place in Israel even unto the fourth generation.
- 10:31 But Jehu did not keep the law of the god Jehova and Israel with all his heart, and did not depart from the sin that Jeroboam had made the Israelites to sin.
- 10:32 In those days, Yahweh and China cut off the kingdoms of Israel, and Hazer attacked the borders of Israel.
- 10:33 But east of the Jordan, all the land of Gilead, from Aroor, which is near the valley of Arnon, was the land of the Gadites of Gilead and Bashan, and of the Reubites, and of Manasseh.
- 10:34 Now the rest of the acts of Jehu, all his deeds, and his might, are they not written in the book of the kings of Israel.
- 10:35 Jehu slept with his fathers and was buried in Samaria. And Jehoahaz his son succeeded him as king.
- 10:36 Jehu reigned in Samaria for twenty-eight years.

It reminds us to strive to be sincerely and wholeheartedly dedicated to God, so that our actions are consistent with His commands.
