Don't fall into the trap of pride

Chapter 10 of 2 Chronicles

"Full of harm and humble benefit" is not only a wise saying among the Chinese, but even in spiritual matters, God has repeatedly made similar appeals to His children through different circumstances.

In fact, if Rehoboam had known to make good use of his father Solomon's shadow and treat his people with kindness, even if Judah could not avoid a divisive fate, it would not have been in Rehoboam's time. Sadly, Rehoboam was carried away by arrogance and foolishness, thinking that he was invincible, and as a result, the elect suffered greatly.

As children of the Lord, we should learn from this and never base our boasting on anything. When we forget to walk in God with humility, we open the door for the devil to undermine God's work.

On the spiritual path, we need to be constantly vigilant and remind ourselves to remain humble and rely on God's wisdom and guidance. Just as Rehoboam caused trouble by pride, we must avoid falling into the trap of pride so that we can walk in God's grace and fulfill His entrusted mission. Let us remember that "grace will find grace to the humble," and use this to motivate ourselves to keep moving forward in spiritual growth.

We ask God to guard our hearts because the fruits of life come from the heart (Proverbs 4:23). Even if everything comes from God, man's choice is just as important. We are to return to the temple of God, seek God's heart, and choose to walk according to God's heart. Haggai said that the last glory was greater than the previous (Haggai 2:9), which foreshadowed the coming of Jesus, the High Priest, who went to the cross for all, and whose blood flowed through the veil of the temple into the Holy of Holies, which was the most glorious hour.

- 10:1 And Rehoboam went to Shechem, because all the Israelites had come to Shechem to make him king.
- 10:2 Jeroboam, the son of Nibat, fled from King Solomon and fled to Egypt, where he dwelt. When he heard this, he came back from Egypt.
- 10:3 And the Israelites sent to him, and he came to Loboam with all the Israelis, and said to him,
- 10:4 Thy father hath made us yoke and labour, and now make the yoke of our labours lighter, and we will serve thee.
- 10:5 And Loboam said to them, Come back to me on the third day. the people went.
- 10:6 And it came to pass, in the days of the days of Solomon, the father of Rehoboam, that old men stood before him, that King Rehoboam consulted with them, and said, What counsel thou hast given me, that I may answer this people.
- 10:7 And the old men said unto him, If the king will be gracious to this people, and make them pleased, and answer them with good words, they shall be king's servants forever.
- 10:8 But the king, without the counsel of the old men for him, consulted with the young men who had grown up with him and stood before him.
- 10:9 And he said, This people say unto me, Thy father hath made us yoke-heavy: make us lighter. What do you think of me, and I will reply to them.
- 10:10 And the young men who grew up with him said, This people said unto the king, Thy father hath made us a heavy yoke: make us lighter. Thus shall the king say unto them, My little thumb is thicker than my father's loins.
- 10:11 My Father has made you yoke heavy, and I will make you yoke harder. My father has beaten you with a whip, and I will beat you with a scorpion.
- 10:12 Jeroboam and all the people did as King Rehoboam said, "Come back to me on the third day," and on the third day they came.
- 10:13 King Rehoboam replied to them with stern words, without the opinion of the old men,

- 10:14 And he said unto them, according to the will of the youth, My father hath made you yoke heavy, and I will make you yoke harder. My father has beaten you with a whip, and I will beat you with a scorpion.
- 10:15 the king would not obey the people . This was of God, that the words of Jehovah by Ahijah the Shiloite might be fulfilled to Jeroboam, the son of Nebat.
- 10:16 When all the Israelites saw that the king did not obey them, they said to the king, "What is our part with David? It had nothing to do with Jesse's son. Go every man to his house, every man of Israel. great wei, take care of yourselves. So all the Israelites went back to their homes.
- 10:17 But the Israelites who dwelt in the cities of Judah, Rehoboam reigned over them.
- 10:18 King Rehoboam sent Hadoram, who was in charge of the afflictions, to the Israelites, and the Israelites stoned him to death. King Rehoboam hurriedly got into his chariot and fled back to Jerusalem.
- 10:19 In this way, the Israelites have rebelled against the Great Avids to this day.
