1 Chronicles 10 chapters

A detailed summary of Chapter 10 of the Chronicles of the Chronicles:

## 1 Chronicles 10 chapters

- 10:1 The Philistines fought with the Israelites, the Israelites fled before the Philistines, and some were killed and fell in Mount Gillybo.
- 10:2 The Philistines pursued Rah and his sons, and slew Ra's sons Jonathan, Abinada, and Mackishua.
- 10:3 The force was so strong that Saul was overtaken by the archers and was seriously wounded.
- Then he commanded them that had his weapons, saying, Draw out your sword and stab me to death, lest those who have not been circumcised come and insult me. But the man who had the weapon was very afraid, and would not stab him.
- 10:5 And Saul himself fell on his sword and died, and those who had weapons saw that Saula was dead and fell on his sword and died.
- 10:6 In this way, Saul died with his three sons and his entire family.
- 10:7 The Israelites who lived in the plains, and saw the Israeli soldiers fleeing, and that Zaro and his sons were dead, abandoned the city and fled, and the Philistines came to live in it.
- 10:8 And it came to pass on the next day that the Philistines came and stripped him of the clothes of the slain man, and saw Saul and his sons and servants falling in Mount Gelibo.
- 10:9 And he stripped him of his armour, and cut off his head, and sent men to the four borders of the land of Philistine, to tell them their images and to all the people.
- 10:10 And they put the armor of Saul in the temple of their gods, and nailed his head in the temple of Dagon.

- 10:11 And the children of Jabesh of Gilead heard all that the Philistines had done to Saul,
- 10:12 And all the warriors who were among them arose, and sent the bodies of Saulo and his sons to Jabesh, and buried their bodies under Jabesh's oak tree, and fasted for seven days.
- 10:13 So Saul died because he had sinned against Yahohua and had not obeyed Yahohua's commandment. and because he inquired of the woman who had sex with demons,
- 10:14 Yahweh was not asked, so Yahweh and Howard had him slain and ascribed the kingdom to David the son of Jesse.
