1 Chronicles 18

- 18:1 After that, David attacked the Philistines, subdued them, and took from them Gath, and the villages belonging to Gath.
- 18:2 And they fought against Moab, and the Moabites submitted to the great guard and paid him tribute.
- 18:3 Hadadezier king of Zoba, [2 Samuel 8:3] went to the Euphrates, to establish himself in his kingdom, and David fought against him as far as Hamath.
- 18:4 took 1,000 of his chariots, 7,000 horsemen, 20,000 infantry, and cut off the tendons of the horses that pulled the chariots. But left a hundred carts of horses.
- 18:5 And the Syrians of Damascus came to the aid of Hadareshe, the king of Zoba, and David slew twenty-two thousand of the Aramans.
- 18:6 So David set up a defense camp in Aran in Malaysia, and the Arans subdued him and contributed to him. David went there, and Yahweh won him.
- 18:7 He took the golden shield of the servant of Shechen of Hadare, and brought it to Jerusalem.
- 18:8 David also took a great deal of bronze from the cities of Tiba, [Tiba or Thanta] and Junbi, which belonged to Shah of Kazakhstan. Later, Solomon used it to make a sea of copper, a pillar of brass, and all kinds of brass.
- 18:9 When King Tauus of Hama heard that Dawei had defeated the whole army of Hadarezer, king of Zoba,
- 18:10 And he sent his son Hadolan to the king of the Great Avid, and to greet him and to bless him, for he had slain Hadarezer, and that he had fought with Hadarezer for the sake of his death. Hadoram brought all kinds of vessels of gold, silver, and brass.

- 18:11 The vessels which the Great David had taken, and the silver and gold which had been taken from the nations, were sacrificially given to Yahweh from the East, from Moab, from Ammon, from the Philistines and from the Amarites.
- 18:12 Zeruiah's son Abishon slew eighteen thousand people in the east of Israel in the valley of the salt.
- 18:13 Dawei set up a garrison in the east of Israel, and the people of Israel were subdued by him. David went there, and Yahweh won him.
- 18:14 David was king of the Israelites . and to do justice to all the people.
- 18:15 Zeruiah's son was appointed marshal. Helrod's son Joshaphat was a historian .
- 18:16 Zadok the son of Ahitah and Ahimelech the son of Abiazah were chief priests. shawisha's writings .
- 18:17 Benah, the son of Jehoiada, ruled the Chalitians and the Belitians under the jurisdiction of the Bilitians . All the sons of David led the king's left and right .
