When we first came to church, we had a very strong sense of gratitude, and suddenly we felt that the things around us were very beautiful, and then we would be truly grateful, and then the longer we believed, the harder it became to be grateful. Taking grace for granted, and when grace is less, it's as if God owes us something, and these are all worth reflecting on. In this chapter we see pride quietly entering our hearts and making us lose our gratitude. When we find ourselves unthankful, that's when something goes wrong with us. When life is full of complaining, it is when our relationship with God is slowly drifting away. David returned to Jerusalem with all the army. He went back in silence, not at all like the feeling of a triumphant return, for there was nothing worth writing about in the eyes of God. Maybe they celebrated and the people rejoiced, but the scriptures were not mentioned, because they were not worth mentioning in the eyes of God and were not remembered. We need to always touch our hearts and warn ourselves that we are drifting away from God in our lives. Do we have something that we think is good, but is not recorded in heaven? "Let him who thinks he is standing take heed lest he fall" (1 Corinthians 10:12), and the more successful and comfortable we are, the more likely we are to lose our vigilance and emerge in the flesh. David's sin with Bathsheba happened when he 'remained in Jerusalem' (v.1).
