1 Chronicles Chapter 21:

A detailed summary of Chapter 21 of the Chronicles of the Ages:

At that time, Satan tempted David to count the Israelites. David listened to Satan, counted the population of the country, and found that the number of Israelites was as high as one million. Afterwards, David felt guilty and confessed to God. God sent the prophet Gad to tell David that there were three ways to punish. When David bought the field, he was willing to pay the full price of the harvest to avoid ill-gotten gains, rather than give it away for free.

David fell into God's hands because of foolishness. We are not to idolize or idealize leaders, God did not choose people to be leaders because he was perfect. Leaders must learn to touch the heart of God, and also know their imperfections, Satan is against Israel, and David is only a tool; However, it is the most fragile part of life that can be excited. When there is a breach in our lives, it becomes a place

where Satan stirs us. In fact, Satan knows each of us very well and knows where our gaps and weaknesses are. But many times we are as foolish as David, and our foolishness is manifested in not listening to others. Clearly, David did not inquire of God or listen to people when it came to counting people. David was hunted down all his life, both by Saul and Absalom, as if God was playing a joke on David. When something that plagues our lives becomes a regularity, and we fall or fail again and again, in fact, God is speaking to us, do we have any lessons that we haven't learned?

Satan always likes to bring about a lot of destruction through human pride. Therefore, if we are always on the watchful side, it will not find a chance to attack us! But if we allow ourselves to remain proud in our hearts, we will drift further and further away from God and cause His wrath!

Because of the pride in his heart, David gave his enemies an opportunity! Man is weak! When we feel discouraged and discouraged, we are always complaining against God. And when God's grace comes, we become so complacent in the process of enjoying abundance and strength that we forget God and fall into the wiles of the enemy!

What's even more terrifying is that the enemy wants us to be paralyzed by sin, even to enjoy the pleasures of sin, not to think that it is sin! But God doesn't want us to indulge in the pleasures of sin, but to examine our hearts and minds more deeply and honestly, and to truly repent to Him!

When David realized his sin, he confessed all his sins before God and repented. This shows the true nature of David's love for God, and he did not defend himself or shift the blame to anyone else, but willingly took the responsibility. In fact, the most serious ill of sin is the severance of spiritual fellowship with God. However, David overcame Satan's temptation to admit his mistakes, repented, and worked to restore his relationship with God.

Know that our actions will implicate others, and we have to take responsibility for what we need to bear, and we must face it bravely, and it is better to fall into the hands of God than in the hands of men. Learn to hear, whether it is the angel sent by God, or the word of God in our hearts; Go and build an altar, be serious with God, and tell God: I am here, I have sinned against heaven, and I have sinned against you, and you have abundant mercy, and I ask you to have mercy on us.

- 21:1 Satan rose up against the Israelites and stirred up several David points.

- 21:12 or three years of famine, or defeat before your enemies, pursued by the sword of their enemies for three months, or the sword of Yahweh in your land, which is three days of plague, and the angels of Yahweh wreck destroy in the four borders of Israel. Now think about it, and I will reply to him who sent me.
- 21:13 David said to Gad, "It is very difficult for me . I want to fall into the hand of Jehovah, because he has abundant mercy. I don't want to fall into human hands .
- 21:14 So the plague of Yahweh and the Israelites . The Israelites died seventy thousand.
- 21:15 God sent messengers to destroy Jerusalem. And when he was about to perish, when Yahweh saw it, he repented, and did not bring this plague, and commanded the angel who destroyed the city, saying, "Enough, stop it." Then the angels of Yahweh stood in the threshing floor of Ornan of Jebusites.
- And David looked up and saw the angel of Jehovah standing between heaven and earth, with a sword drawn in his hand, stretched out over Jerusalem. The guards and elders were dressed in sackcloth and prostrated on the ground.

- The Great David prayed to God, "It is not us who command the number of the people; I have sinned and done evil . But what did the sheep do? May the hand of Yahweh and the Hand of my God be against me and my Father's house. Do not fight against your people, or send pestilences against them.

- And the king of David said unto Arnan, No, I will buy it from thee at a full price. I will not offer Yahweh with your goods, nor will I offer for a burnt offering with anything for nothing.
- 21:25 So David leveled the ground with six hundred shekels of gold for Arnan.
- David built a altar for Yahweh there, offered burnt offerings and peace offerings, and appealed to Yahweh. And Jehovah answered him, and sent fire from heaven upon the altar of burnt offerings.
- 21:27 And Jehohua commanded his messengers, and he put his sword in his sheath.
- 21:28 Then David saw that Jehovah had given him permission at the floor of Arnan the Jebusite, and was there to offer sacrifices.

- 21:29 The tabernacle and the altar of burnt offerings, which Moses had made in the wilderness, were on the heights of Gibeon.
- but the great avid did n't dare to go and ask god . for they were afraid of the sword of the messenger of Yahweh.
- 21:31 David said that this was the temple of the god Yahweh, and the altar where the Israelites offered burnt offerings.
