1 Chronicles 27

When King David of Israel was old, he assigned duties to the leaders and tribes of Israel, and made a list of his ministers, generals, and commanders. They took turns to serve the king every month. Among them were those in charge of the royal estates, those in charge of the various places, those in charge of the king's storerooms, and those in charge of the treasury. There are also those in charge of agriculture, vineyards, olive groves and mulberry groves, who take turns in their respective months. Finally, a list of David's brothers, captains of the army, and heads of the families is given.

This chapter describes the organization of King David in his later years and gives a list of officials and managers at all levels who were responsible for the affairs of the state. David saw himself as beloved of God, and he reigned with the LORD, over the earth, over the birds of the air, over the fish of the sea, and over the beasts of the earth. David not only had a strong army, but also a strong economy, and in David's arrangement, we can get a glimpse of what it means to reign with God, what it means to rule the earth, and what it means to be fruitful and multiply, to fill

the whole earth, and to rule the earth. Although the Bible does not say that David was the second Adam, he did exactly what Adam could not. David not only guarded the Garden of Eden, but also blessed the twelve tribes.

David learned the principles of God's rule and became more confident in God's promise, and now that God had promised the patriarch Abraham, "I will make thy seed as many as the dust of the earth, and if a man can number the dust of the earth, he shall number thy seed" (Gen. 13:16). God promised Abraham that the Israelites would be as numerous as the stars in the sky, and we are to dwell in God's promise, believing that God will bless us greatly, be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth.

As Christians, we are called to be good stewards of the faithful and good. This is not only our stewardship of material resources, but also all that God has given us. The faithful protection and rational use of time, talents, relationships, and the gospel message.

#### We're going to:

# 1. Recognize the meaning of housekeeping

There are many references to faithful stewardship in the Bible. Luke 12:42 says, "And the Lord said, Who is he the faithful and discreet steward, whom hath he appointed over his household, and to give them food in due season?" This passage emphasizes the qualities of a steward—faithfulness and discernment. Like this steward, we should be diligent in managing every resource God has entrusted to us.

#### 2. The steward of time

Time is a resource that cannot be recycled, and we need to use it wisely. Ephesians 5:15-16 says, "Therefore take heed not as fools, but as wise. Make the most of your time, for this age is evil." We should have a reasonable plan to devote our time to ministry that is good for us and others, such as Bible reading, prayer, evangelism, and serving others.

God has given each person a different talent and ability, and we are to make good use of these gifts to glorify God and bless others. look for opportunities to serve the church and community, whether it be teaching, singing, caring, or other forms of service.

# 4: Steward of possessions

Financial management is an important aspect of faithful stewardship. Matthew 6:19–21 reminds us, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth...... but lay up treasures in heaven...... for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

### 5: Stewards of the gospel

First Corinthians 9:17 says, "If I do this willingly, I have a reward; If I am not reconciled, the responsibility has been entrusted to me."
