He understood God's heart, prayed to God from God's perspective on man, and asked God to listen to God's will to be done, even if people were in the land of opposition, if they changed their minds. Chapter 6 of the Second Chronicles of the Ages

- 6:1 At that time Solomon said, "Jehohua had said that he would dwell in a dark place."
- But I have built a house for your dwelling place, for your everlasting dwelling.
- 6:3 And the king turned his face to the congregation of Israel, and the congregation of Israel stood.
- 6:4 Solomon said, Blessed be the God of Jehova and Israel. for what he had promised my father David with his own mouth was fulfilled with his own hands.
- 6:5 He said, "Since I brought my people out of the land of Egypt, I have not chosen a city among the tribes of Israel to build a house for my name, nor have I chosen a man to be ruler of my people Israel."
- 6:6 But I chose Jerusalem as the dwelling place of my name, and I chose the Great Sanitation to govern my people.
- 6:7 And Solomon said, My father David hath purposed to build a house in the name of the god Israel for Jehovah.

- 6:8 But Yahweh said to David my father, "Thou hast determined to build a house for my name, and that is a good idea.
- But thou shalt not build a house, but thy sons shall build a house for my name.
- 6:10 Now Yahweh has fulfilled his promise, that I may sit in the throne of Israel after my father David has built a temple in the name of the god of Jehovah.
- 6:11 I have set the ark of the covenant in it, and in it is the covenant of Jehovah, which he made with the Israelites.
- 6:12 Solomon stood before the altar of Jehohua in the presence of the congregation of Israel, and lifted up his hands.
- 6:13 And Solomon made a bronze table, five cubits long, five cubits wide, and three cubits high, and laid them in the middle of the court. And he stood on the stage, and knelt down in front of the congregation of Israel, and raised his hand to heaven,
- 6:14 Say, Yahweh, God of Israel, there is no god like you in heaven or on earth. You keep covenants and show mercy to the servant who walks before you with all your heart.
- Now the promise made to thy servant my Father David has been fulfilled. You have promised with your own mouth, and you have done it with your own hands, just as you are today.
- 6:16 Yahweh, God of Israel, the word which thou hast promised thy servant my father David says, If thy children take heed to their own ways, and keep my law, as thou hast done before me, and men will continue to sit in the Israeli-listed kingdom. Now I ask you to fulfill it.
- 6:17 O God of Israel of Yahweh, fulfill the word you have promised to your servant David.
- 6:18 Does God really dwell with the world on earth? Behold, the heavens and the heavens are not sufficient for thy dwelling, how much more for this house which I have built?
- 6:19 But the God of Yahweh will look upon the prayer and supplication of his servant, and hear the prayer and cry of his servant before you.
- 6:20 Watch over this house day and night, the dwelling place that you have promised to make your name. Hear the prayer of your servant here.
- 6:21 When thy servants and thy people Zerel pray to this place, hear them from heaven and thy dwelling place, and hear and forgive.
- 6:22 If a man sins against his neighbor and is told to swear an oath, he comes to this house and swears before your altar,
- Hear from heaven, and judge your servant, and condemn the wicked, and recompense him according to his works. The righteous man is righteous, and rewards him according to his righteousness.

- 6:24 If thy people Israel sin against thee, and are defeated before their enemies, and turn their hearts, and confess thy name, and ask thee for prayer in this house,
- 6:25 Hear from heaven, and forgive the sins of thy people Eliel, and restore them to the land which thou hast given them and to their fathers.
- 6:26 If your people have sinned against you, and you have punished them, so that the heavens are shut up from rain, and they pray to this place, and confess your name, and turn away from their sins,
- 6:27 Hear in heaven, and forgive the sins of thy servants and thy people Eliel, and teach them the good deeds that should be done, and rain upon thy land, which thou hast given unto thy people for an inheritance.
- 6:28 If there be famine, pestilence, drought, mildew, locusts, grasshoppers, or enemies, besieging cities, whatever calamity or disease befalls in the land,
- 6:29 Thy people Israelel, be it all or one, and feel that the calamity is great, lift up their hands unto this house, whatever they ask or pray,
- 6:30 Hear and forgive from heaven and your dwelling place. Thou knowest the hearts of men, and do unto them as they are done,
- 6:31 that they may fear thee all the life of their life in the land which thou gaveth given unto our fathers, and walk in thy ways.
- As for the Gentiles, who are not of thy people Israel, pray unto this house from afar, for thy great name and for thy mighty hand, and for thy outstretched arm,
- 6:33 Hear from heaven and your dwelling place, and do as the Gentiles ask, that all the people of the world may know your name, and fear you, as your people are Eliel, and that they may know that this house which I have built is called by your name.
- 6:34 If thy people are sent by thee, whithersoever they go to battle against their enemies, pray unto the city of thy choosing, and to the house which I have built for thy name,
- 6:35 Hear their prayers and supplications from heaven, that they may prevail.
- 6:36 If your people sin against you, for there is no one in the world who does not sin, you will be angry with them and give them to your enemies and carry them captive far or near.
- 6:37 If they think of sin in the land of captivity, and change their minds, and beseech thee, saying, We are guilty, we have rebelled, we have done evil.
- 6:38 If they submit to thee with all their heart and soul in the land of their captivity, and pray unto their own land, the land which thou hast given unto their fathers, and the city which thou hast chosen, and the house which I have built for thy name,
- Hear the prayer and supplication of your people from your heavenly dwelling place, and avenge them, and forgive their transgressions.

- Now, O my God, keep your eyes open and your ears inclined, and incline your ears to the prayer that is offered in this place.
- 6:41 Arise, O God of China, and enter with the ark of thy powerful covenant into resting place. Yahweh, may thy priests be clothed with salvation. May your saints be blessed and rejoice.
- 6:42 Yahweh, do not reject your anointed, but remember the mercy that you have shown to your servant Mahavid.

- 5. "If thou wilt answer the prayer of thy people Israel unto thee, and praise thy name, when they pray unto thee in this house, hear their prayer in thy dwelling place in heaven, and answer their supplication." (2 Chronicles 6:21) This verse describes King Solomon's desire for God to hear Israel's pleas to pray to him in the temple and to grant their request.

Recognizing that the temple was a place of prayer, Solomon asked God to answer prayers in seven ways. The first thing, recorded in 2 Chronicles 6:22-23, is when a person needs righteous judgment.

2 Chronicles 6:22-23 says, "If a man sins against his neighbor and is called to take an oath, he comes to this house and swears before your altar, hear from heaven and judge your servant: condemn the wicked, and recompense him according to his deeds; Define man rightly, and reward him according to his righteousness. This passage says, "If a man sins against his neighbor and is told to swear, he will come to this house and swear before your altar,,..... which shows that this "oath" is to come to God and seek God's judgment.

In Numbers 5:11-31, there is an entire passage about how to "swear" to God when one's innocence is in doubt. This kind of "oath" will have obvious consequences for the person who swears. It was either a blessing or a curse, so that others could see whether he was guilty or innocent.

Then in 2 Chronicles 6:24-25, Solomon prayed to God to hear his prayer in the second way: "If your people Israel have sinned against you and are defeated before their enemies, they will turn their minds and confess your name, and they will pray to you in this house and pray that you will hear from heaven and forgive the sins of your people Israel and return them to the land you gave them and to their fathers." This prayer says: When the Israelites were defeated in the war, if they could turn their minds and pray to God, that God would hear, forgive them, and help them.

What is the third thing. 2 Chronicles 6:26-27: "If your people have sinned against you, and you punish them so that the heavens do not rain, and they pray to this place, and confess your name, and turn away from their sins, hear them in heaven, and forgive the sins of your servants and your people Israel, and teach them what is to be done, and rain on your land, which you have given to your people to inherit." "

This passage speaks of what David experienced in the days of the prophet Elijah. In Deuteronomy 28:22-24, drought is a curse that God inflicts on people when they do not obey God's commands. If people repent and confess that the Lord is God, as the Israelites did in their day, God will have mercy and rain again.

2 Chronicles 6:28-31 is the fourth event of Solomon's prayer. Or when it comes to the calamities that befell the Israelites, when they rebelled against God and faced difficulties, they should turn to God and receive God's forgiveness. Look at 2 Chronicles 6:28-31:

"If there be famine, or pestilence, or drought, or mildew, or locusts, or grasshoppers, or if an enemy is besieging a city in the midst of a land, and whatever evil or disease befalls you, your people Israel, or all of you, or even one man, feel that the calamity is very bitter, and lift up their hands to this house, whatever they ask or pray, hear forgiveness from heaven and your dwelling place. Thou knowest the hearts of men, and thou shalt do unto them according to their ways—but thou knowest the hearts of men—that thou mayest fear thee all the days of their lives, and walk in thy ways, in the land which thou gavest unto our fathers."

The fifth thing is especially precious to us. Even Solomon prayed that God would hear the prayers of the Gentiles. Let's look at 2 Chronicles 6:32-33: "As for the Gentiles who are not of your people Israel, come from afar for your great name and your mighty hand and outstretched arm, and pray to this house from afar, hear from heaven and your dwelling place, and walk according to the prayer of the Gentiles, that all the nations of the world may know your name and fear you, as your people Israel did, and let them know that this house which I have built is called by your name." "

By "Gentiles" we do not mean the "Gentiles" who live among the Israelites, but all the races that do not belong to the Israelites, just like us.

The sixth thing is prayer in the midst of war against the enemy. It is recorded in 2 Chronicles 6:34-35: "If your people are sent by you to fight against their enemies wherever they go, and pray to the city of your choice and to the house that I have built for your name, hear their prayer and supplication from heaven and give them victory." "

The seventh thing to pray. 2 Chronicles 6:36-39 says, "If your people sin against you—there is no one in the earth who does not sin—and you are angry with them, and you deliver them over to their enemies, and they are carried captive to a land near or far, and if they remember their sins in the land of captivity, and change their minds, and beg you, 'We have sinned, we have rebelled, and we have done evil,' if they have turned to you with all their heart and soul in the land of captivity, and have prayed to their land, the land which you gave to their fathers, and the city that

you have chosen, and the house that I have built for your name, Hear the prayer and supplication of thy people from your heavenly dwelling place, and avenge them, and forgive their transgressions. This is the seventh thing Solomon prayed for, and it must have been especially comforting to the Israelites who had been uprooted and experienced the loss of their country.

Chapter 6 of 2 Chronicles goes on to record the genealogies of Israel's history, particularly the descendants of the tribe of Levi, and about the temple built by King Solomon. This chapter focuses on the role of the Levites and the importance of the temple.
