- 17:1 And Jehoshaphat the son of Asa reigned in his stead, and he strengthened himself against the Israelites.
- And he placed the army in all the fortified cities of Judah, and the garrisons in the land of Judah, and in the cities of Ephraim, which his father Asa, had possessed.
- 17:3 Jehohua was with Jehoshaphat . for he walked in the way of his father's David in the beginning, and did not seek Baal,
- but seek the God of his father, and do his commandments, and not the ways of the Israelites.
- 17:5 Therefore Jehovah was firm in his kingdom, and all the people of Judah paid tribute to him. Jehoshaphat had great honorable wealth.
- 17:6 He happily followed the teachings of Jehohua and removed all the altars and puppets from Judah.
- 17:7 In the third year of his reign he sent his servants Benhaiel, and Obadiah, and Zechariah, and Nathaniel, and Micaia, to all the cities of Judah to teach the people.
- 17:8 And with them were Shemaiah the Levites, and Nethaniah, and Zebadiah, and Asahel, and Shemelamoth, and Jonathan, and Adonijah, and Tobiah, and Hompbardoniah, and Elishamah the priest, Joram was with them.
- 17:9 They took with them the book of the law of Jehohua and went through all the cities of Judah to teach and teach the people.

- 17:10 Jehohua made all the nations around Judah fearful, and did not dare to fight against Joshaphat.
- 17:11 Some of the Philistines gave gifts and tribute to Jehoshaphat. And the Arabians gave him seven thousand seven hundred rams, and seven thousand seven hundred male goats.
- 17:12 Jehoshaphat grew stronger and stronger, and built a fortified and hoarding city in Judah.
- 17:13 He had many works in the cities of Judah and soldiers in Jerusalem, and he was a mighty warrior.
- 17:14 And their number, according to their fathers, is recorded below: of the tribe of Judah, the mighty men of Aanna, and at the head of the mighty men were thirty thousand.
- 17:15 secondly, the commander of the thousands, Johanan, led 280,000 mighty warriors.
- 17:16 The second was Amaziah, the son of Ziri, who sacrificed himself for the sake of Yahweh, and led two hundred thousand mighty men.
- 17:17 The children of Benjamin were mighty warriors led by Elijah, with bows and arrows and shields, two hundred thousand.
- 17:18 Second, Jozabal led 180,000 men who were prepared for war.
- 17:19 These were for the king, and not in the king's fortified cities in all the land of Judah.
