Prophet speaks with tears flow from his heart

The central idea of Jeremiah 8 is to warn the people not to ignore God's warnings and judgments because their sins must be punished. In verses 1–3, Jeremiah describes the death and destruction of the people, whose bodies were abandoned outside the city and left no one to bury them. (8:3) . It is Satan's worshippers who are killed, and most of them are tempted to worship Satan because of greed, lust, money, fame, and fortune. The more they worship Satan, the more Satanic they become, acting unfairly, greedily, deceitfully, and unashamedly, and his influence has spread from one country to the whole world.

In verses 4–13, Jeremiah reveals the sins of the people and their straying from God's ways. They do not obey God's laws, do not act and think uprightly, and are only concerned with their own interests and pleasures. Their sins provoked God's wrath and judgment. The Jews backslidden, but did not look back. Every man who turns to his own way does not walk according to the law or the right way, and does not know the law of God (7).

[8:12] The prophets and priests are lying and misleading the people, and they are greedy (10). Out of greed, they misinterpreted the Torah to suit their desires. These were God's servants, knowingly committing crimes, and their sins were added to the first degree, so God said that they would be completely destroyed, and they would lose everything. The people of Judah had reached a point where they were not ashamed, and they did not care at all about their own shame. Paul calls these people "people with a broken conscience" (Ephesians 4:19), in other words, they are already people who are unable to obey God's creative order. Yet, even with the magnitude of their sins, the saints today can still be healed. For the Word of God pierces and cuts

open even the soul and the spirit, the joints and the marrow (Heb. 4:12), and is the light of healing. However, those who do not repent will lose all hope. When we use Jeremiah 8 to reflect on the condition of our hearts, we choose to do God's will and obey the Holy Spirit, and we will surely have peace, blessings, and life.

In verses 14-17, the people hope for peace, but instead of peace, they are terrified (15). In the midst of the great army oppression, Jeremiah continued to call on the people to truly repent and turn to God. They must confess their sins and change their behavior. Otherwise, they will face the fate of disaster and destruction. This article predicts that when the trial comes, the people who have given up on themselves will cry out and mourn. If you miss the opportunity given by God, you will not be able to be restored, not only will you be regarded as a useless servant, but you will not be able to stand in the place of glory that God should promise, or even be cast out in outer darkness and regret there (Matt. 25:30).

In verses 18–22, Jeremiah was grieved and fainted because he saw that the people had been living in deception. They thought that if there was a temple in Jerusalem, they would be safe. God made a covenant with David, so the Lord must be in Zion, and Zion must be safe, but the reality is that the Babylonian army has invaded. The people did not understand why this was happening. Then he asked with great sorrow: Is the LORD not in Zion? Isn't the king of Zion among them? Jeremiah prayed and prayed for God's mercy and deliverance for the people. He acknowledged the sins of the people and strayed from God's ways, but he believed that God's mercy and love could save them. Verse 19 is a great reminder that idolatry and belief in false gods are the causes of suffering. If you have idols in your house, even if you don't worship them, you are sinning against God. We should not profess faith in Jesus and worship idolatry at the same time, which provokes God to anger.

The prophet Jeremiah was distressed when he saw the people in exile and heard their wails in a foreign land. He wept until there were no more tears because of the disobedience of the people, and he longed for more tears to continue to intercede for the people. But I also wish I could leave this group of ungrateful people and ignore them anymore. 8:22 uses rhetorical questions, but of course there is a way for the people to be healed: repent and turn to God! Exile is forever just a means of discipline for God, the purpose of which is to awaken the people he loves.

Are we experiencing God's discipline? If so, thank God for tearing down the false and false reliance in our lives. If we know He is calling us to repentance, even if we think it's too late, it's never too late with God!

- 8:1 And Jehohua said, The bones of the king of Judah, and the bones of his princes, and the bones of the priests, and the bones of the prophets, and the bones of the inhabitants of Jerusalem shall be taken out of the tombs.

- 8:5 Why did this people of Jerusalem perpetuate their backsliding? They are deceitful and will not turn back.
- 8:6 I listened attentively and heard them speak unrighteous things. No one repents of his wicked deeds and says, What have I done? They turned to their own ways and went straight into battle like horses.
- 8:7 the stork in the sky, the timing of the coming and going of knowledge. turtle doves and swallows and white cranes also wait for the season to come but my people know no of the laws of the Hovah.
- 8:8 How shall you say, We have wisdom, and the law of Yahweh is in us. Behold, the prosthetic pen dance of the scribes is deceitful.
- 8:9 wise people are ashamed, frightened, and captured. What wisdom do they have in their hearts when they forsake the words of Jehovah?
- 8:10 Therefore I will give their wives and children to others, and their fields to others for inheritance. because they are greedy from the smallest to the greatest. From the prophets to the priests, they all deceitful.

In the scriptures here, God again emphasizes the plight of the people and the false claims of false prophets. These false prophets spoke false words of peace, but in reality, the people were destroyed and harmed everywhere. God calls people to be vigilant and to seek true peace and salvation.

Jeremiah 8 goes on to describe the rebellion and backsliding of the people of Israel and reveals their neglect and rejection of God. In this chapter, there are several important theological central ideas and theological gains:
