In Jeremiah's prophecy, it is often thought that what is about to happen is only a stone's throw away, but this is not the case. Today, more than 2,000 years after the resurrection and ascension of the Lord Jesus, and the promise of the return of the Lord Jesus seems to be about to be fulfilled and seems to be far away, we should be encouraged by this period of the return of the Israel people and watch out for the return of the Lord with good hope.

Jeremiah 30 is devoted to God's salvation and comfort. This chapter begins with a foreshadowing of a time to come, when God will deliver His people and return them to the land of Judea. This chapter shows Jehovah's mercy and grace in forgiving the people and extending his saving hand to them despite their many sins. Chapter 30 is a great comfort to the fact that although the Israel were in exile, God promised that the time would come for deliverance, so they were advised not to be afraid. God said that the calamity that befell them was like a birth disaster, but God would break the yoke of the enemy and remove the cords, so that they would be freed from the Gentiles and return to the King who served the Lord and God raised up for them, and comforted them again and again to let them know that God was still with them even if they were in captivity, and

God said that Judah's wounds were incurable by idols, and that he meant the idols worshipped, because the wounds were too deep, and the sins were too great, and the sins were numerous. God kept warning them, but they didn't listen, so God gave them over to them. God said He would heal them, help them, heal them, and even though they were in a foreign country, God would still watch for them, protect them, and bring them back. Israel will not only return, but will rebuild a restored city, with voices of thanksgiving and joy, and will grow in number and honor. Jeremiah 30

- 30:1 The words of Jeremiah came to Jeremiah and said,
- 30:2 The God of Israel said Yahweh, "Write down everything I have said to you."
- 30:3 And Yahweh said, The day is coming, and I will bring back my people Israel and the great captives. and I will bring them back to the land which I gave them to their fathers, and they will have it as an inheritance. this is what ye and hua said.
- 30:4 The following is what Yahweh said about Israel and Jedas.
- 30:5 Jerewah said this, "When we hear the voice, it is a voice of trembling fear and not peace.
- 30:6 If you come and see, how can I see that people are pinching their waists with their hands, like women who are in distress, and their faces are turned blue.

- 30:11 For I am with you to save you; and scatter the kingdoms where you have come, and destroy them completely, but not wipe you out completely, but punish you leniently, and never punish you . [ not to punish you or to acquit you ] this is what Yahweh said.
- 30:12. Yahweh says, Your wounds are incurable, and your wounds are very serious.
- 30:13 No one has made a complaint against you, so that your wounds have been bandaged, and you have no good medicine for them.
- 30:14 All your loved ones have forgotten you and have not come to inquire about you. Because of the great iniquity of thy iniquity, and the multitude of thy iniquities, I have wounded thee with the evil which I inflicted on thee, and I have punished thee with the punishment of the cruel.
- 30:15 Why do you wail because of your wounds, for there is no cure for your pains, and because of the great sin of you, and because of the great number of your iniquities, I have put them on you.
