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A vision of Jesus Christ

In Revelation chapter 1, John was inspired by God and instructed to write down what he saw in order to convey God's message to the seven Asian churches. John described a vision he saw on the Sabbath of a man dressed in robes, girded with a golden girdle, hair as white as wool, eyes like flames, and feet like brass burning in a furnace. This man spoke to him, calling himself Alpha and Omega, the beginning and end of God. John saw him holding in his hands seven stars, which represented the angels of the seven churches, and the seven golden lampstands representing the seven churches. Chapter 1 is a distinctly intersecting structure.

Seven Letters (1-3) Lamb (4-5) Seven Seals and Seven Trumpets (6-11) Women-Three Beasts-Lamb (12-14) Seven Bowls (15-18) Lamb Feast (19:1-22:5) Millennium, Last Judgment, New Heavens and New Earth, New Jerusalem

Reiterating the revelation (22:6-21) Jesus commanded John to write down these messages, as these churches need correction and encouragement in order to strengthen their faith and move forward.

At the time the book of Revelation was written, the gospel had been preached throughout Asia, and believers believed that Jesus of Nazareth, the Son of God, Christ, had risen from the dead, ascended to heaven, and would return to judge and establish the kingdom of God.

The book of Revelation is written for a small group of believers who are filled with these questions, who are persecuted, who are full of doubts, who are in hiding. The Holy Spirit revealed to them in time that the future did not belong to the Roman Empire, nor to any earthly

power, but to Christ and the Church. Although the drama on the stage of history may seem the opposite, the Holy Spirit leads us to heaven and behind the scenes, and uses one vision after another to show us that the true authority belongs to God, and God always sits as king; The real protagonist is Christ and His Church. Just as the cross was not the end of the life of the Lord Jesus, the resurrection proves that death is His victory. In the same way, martyrdom is not the end of a believer's life, and the resurrected martyrs will have a share in the victory of the kingdom. Thus, the book of Revelation greatly encouraged believers, and the next two hundred years were the most persecuted times for the Church, as well as the most courageous and powerful times for the Church.

People today have to decide between two choices: two spirits (a. 10; xvi:14), two kinds of worship (xiv:7; xiii.4), two kinds of sigils (vii. 3; xiii. 16), two kinds of afflictions (vii. 14; ii. 22), two women (xii. 12; xvii. 1), two types of children (xii. 17; xvii.5), two kinds of followers (xiv. 4; xiii. 3), two cities (x21:2; xviii.2), two harvests (xiv. 15; xiv. 18), two feasts (xiv. 9; xix. 17).

The message of the book of Revelation transcends time and space, and the power and promises given to the seven churches will be given to us in the same way. No matter how great the pressures of circumstance may seem, a faithful church will prevail because the Lord has promised, "On this rock I will build my church; The authority of hell shall not prevail against him" (Matt. 16:18). No matter how strong the momentum of the world may seem, the glorious Babylon will fall because the Lord will come soon, when "the kingdoms of the world will become the kingdom of my Lord and of Christ" (11:15), and we will reign with Him "forever and ever" (225)!

Dispensationalism (according to interpreters, the seven churches foreshadow the seven epochs of church history): Ephesus represents the church in the first century, Smyrna represents the age of persecution, Pergamum represents the age of the state religion, Thyatira represents the age of Catholicism, Sardis represents the age of the Reformation, Philadelphia represents the age of modern missions, and Laodicea represents the age of modern apostasy. Rev 1:12 "I turned to see who spoke to me; And when he had turned around, he saw seven golden candlesticks."

- 'Seven golden lampstands' (v.12) does not refer to a single lampstand with seven lamps (Exodus 25:31-39), but to seven separate lampstands representing the seven churches (v.20). Gold symbolizes God's character in the Bible, and the church is God's golden lampstand. The oil that makes the lampstand shine is the Holy Spirit (Zechariah 4:6), and it is only by the power of the Holy Spirit that the church can illuminate the darkness in the hearts of the world
- The "Son of Man" in the middle of the candlestick symbolizes Christ's constant presence among his own people, watching over his church.
- 1. The 144,000 people who were sealed were Israel who believed during the Great Tribulation (7:4-8).
- 2. The 144,000 who stood with the Lamb on Mount Zion were martyrs during the Great Tribulation (xiv. 1).

- 3. The church will be raptured once and again in the great tribulation, before the seventh trumpet (xi:12; xiv. 16).
- 4. The millennial kingdom is not a spiritual symbol, but a literal thousand-year reign of Christ on earth (21–6).
- 5. The world will go bad and worse before Christ's return, and Christ will come before the millennial kingdom (201-6).

Background to the Book of Revelation

1. Age of the author

At that time, the Church was facing great persecution, and successive generations of Roman emperors were tyrannical and bloody. King Nile killed the apostle Paul; Seventy A.D. burned down the city of Jerusalem and blamed the Christians, the prelude to the massacre of Christians, the apostle Peter, the young Timothy and other believers were martyred one after another, the church had no hope, the Christian family was ruined, life was in danger, work and family were insecure, and there was a great battle! For believers who faced persecution and death at that time, to hold on to their faith without compromise, three guarantees are mentioned here. First, "Behold, he comes in the clouds! All eyes will see him, even those who pierce him. and all the families of the earth shall mourn because of him. This is true. Amen!" (v.7) There is great hope that Jesus Christ will soon return and will "come in the clouds" and be in control of all things, and the whole world will be changed!

Second, God uses His divinity to guarantee that He is the Almighty, the Almighty, the Author and the Creator! Earthly kings, governments, and even persecution will pass, but God will live forever! When Christ returns, all who have hurt Him will see it, and all nations will weep because of Him, because He will judge, "The word is true"!

Third, "I, John, am your brother, partakers with you in Jesus' afflictions, in his kingdom, in his endurance, for the word of God, and for the testimony of Jesus, on that island called Patmos. Moved by the Holy Spirit, through the Word of God and by the testimony of Jesus, beginning with the preaching of the gospel by Jesus Christ on earth, "The kingdom of heaven is at hand!" The entry of Christ's kingdom into Satan's kingdom is a battle between two kingdoms, in which we will face tribulation and patience!

The author of this book, John, the Apostle John, was written around 96 A.D. and was banished to the island of Patmos, about 95 kilometers southwest of Ephesus, around A.D. 94-96, where he saw and recorded visions of the book of Revelation.

Description of the Lord Jesus:

1. He was clothed in a long garment, which hung down to his feet.

- 2. The belt of gold is around His breast: 'The breast' is the place of the heart, which signifies love; The "Golden Belt" signifies divine power.
- 3. His head and hair were white: a symbol of holiness, glory, and wisdom.
- 4. His eyes are like a flame of fire: The eyes of the Lord are clear and see all things.
- 5. His feet are like a bolt of light in a furnace: the Lord is strong and powerful, and can trample on all enemies.
- 6. And his voice is like the voice of many waters: a mountain of might, full of authority, and no one can argue with him.
- 7. He holds seven stars in His right hand: His right hand represents the power and protection of God; The seven golden lampstands refer to the seven churches, and the seven stars refer to the messengers of the seven churches.
- 8. A two-edged sword came out of His mouth: The Lord will judge the church and the world with the Word of God.
- 9. His face shines like the scorching sun: the Lord is the sun of righteousness.

Man cannot stand in the presence of such a majestic and glorious Christ. and fell on his face as if he were dead.

The book is full of fantastical symbolisms, and the dazzling and unimaginable calamities and monsters of all kinds make many people either shy away from it or treat it as a fable. But the purpose of these visions and symbols is not to confuse readers, but to convey the truth to them in a persuasive and memorable way. The book of Revelation is written for the suffering believers of the early church, not for theologians to guess, but to comfort and strengthen ordinary believers, to bless the faithful, warn the unfaithful, and encourage the suffering church to keep its covenants and faithfully await Christ's return.

The book of Genesis, the first book of the Bible, exposes Satan's schemes and declares God's curse on Satan. The book of Revelation, the last book of the Bible, prophesied the end of Satan's defeat and declared God's complete victory. The book of Revelation is the culmination of the entire Bible, revealing not only the end of history and the triumph of the kingdom, but also linking the remaining sixty-five books to provide a satisfactory conclusion of all the threads in God's plan of salvation.

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- The "Son of Man" in the middle of the candlestick symbolizes Christ's constant presence among his own people, watching over his church.
- Christ is the High Priest who has ascended to heaven. 'A golden girdle is tied around the breast' (v.13), which is the garb of an angel (15:6), which may represent honor. For the high priest's belt was not a "gold belt," but "a belt of fine twisted linen, made of hand-embroidered linen."
- "His hair was all white, as white wool, and as snow" (v. 14), which is the image of God (Dan. 7:9).
- "The eyes are like a flame of fire" indicates that Christ is "the one who searches the hearts and bowels of men" (2:23) and can "search all the earth"

- "Temper the bright bronze in the furnace" represents the trial.
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- 'He had seven stars in his right hand' (v.16), indicating that the 'seven stars' belonged to Christ. The 'seven stars' represent the messengers of the seven churches (v.20).
- "A two-edged sword came out of his mouth," symbolizing the irresistible judgment of Christ's Word (Heb. 4:12).
- 'His face shines like the sun' (v.16), which is the image of Christ seen by the apostle John as he ascended the mountain.
- 'fell at His feet as dead' (v.17), representing reverence (Ezekiel 1:28). The first reaction of those who truly see the Lord in the Spirit is not to exclaim with excitement and enthusiasm, but to immediately recognize their sin and uncleanness.
- The Lord pressed John 'with his right hand' (v.16) and 'with his right hand' (v.17), showing that Christ held the church in His hands and looked out for the needs of each of us.
- When the Lord Jesus was walking on the sea, He told His disciples to "not be afraid" (Matt. 14:27). When he was transfigured, He also told His disciples to "not be afraid" (Matt. 17:7). Now that he has ascended to heaven, he tells us not to be afraid (v.17). Therefore, let not be afraid of the suffering church.
- 'Hades' (v.18) does not refer to hell, but to the temporary dwelling place of one's soul after death. 'Bearing the keys of death and Hades' (v.18) symbolizes that only Christ has authority over death and Hades, not in the hands of the enemy. The head of the church has the right to send people into hell and to set them free, so that the suffering believers are comforted.
- Verse 19 identifies three main parts of the book of Revelation: 1. "What we see" (v.19), which may refer to the vision that John saw in this chapter (vv.1–20) to give us a glimpse of the glorified resurrected Christ. 2. 'The present things' (v.19), the letters to the seven churches in chapters 2 and 3, give us a glimpse of Christ's exhortation and comfort to the churches. 3. 'What is to come' (v.19), the prophecy in chapters 4–22, gives us a glimpse of how Christ will accomplish the kingdom of God and bring the church on earth to eternal glory. And the main character of this book is Christ and His Church.

- 3. Revelation 1:8 The Lord God says, "I am Alpha, and I am Omega, the Almighty, who was, is, and will ever be." "
- 4. Revelation 1:17-18 When John saw Jesus, he fell at his feet as if he were dead. Jesus laid his right hand on him and said, "Do not be afraid! I am the first, I am the last, and I am the one who lives. I have died, and now I am alive again, for ever and ever, and I have the keys of death and Hades."
