Psalm 29:

When we tremble in the storm, we draw near to God

When we come to God to pray, many times we talk about our needs, and we thank God for His blessings. However, David was special in that he would think of God and think from God's point of view, thinking that he lived in a palace of cedar wood, but the ark of the covenant of the Lord was in a curtain, and he wanted to build a temple for God. He really loved the temple of God, to the point that God would not allow him to build it, and he would not feel harmed. Instead, he helped prepare the materials for the temple, and in the end, God gave him the blueprints for the temple. Therefore, on the surface, it seems that Solomon built the temple, but in fact, David is the chief designer and chief engineer of the temple, because he took care of everything, and David really loved God with all his heart!

David mentions several ideas: First, Lord, you are the greatest, the mighty, the glory, the mighty, the mighty; All that is in heaven and on earth is yours." Second, we were all passers-by, but God had given us to handle these things. David was soon about to finish his days on earth, and he could not take away any gold or silver, so he gave it all and called the congregation to such an idea. Third, David spent thirty years of his life building a temple for God, and everything had to do with building a temple. He struggled for thirty years and said, "I went through it, I really loved God, and finally I gave it my all."

The poem depicts a great storm that originates in the ocean, accompanied by gusts of wind and thunder, and dazzling lightning, which begins in the Mediterranean, sweeps through the mountains of Lebanon, and finally disappears into the eastern desert. The psalmist praises God for His incomparable majesty in this storm.

When all things tremble in the storm, draw near to God. We know that the master of this storm is our God, and that He raised it up so that "all things work together" so that we can know "the voice of Jehovah" in the sun and "the voice of Jehovah" in the storm. Thus, what an unbeliever sees is only the storms, pains, and troubles of life, but what believers see is "his glory." In the course of life, sometimes it is inevitable to be in a storm and thunderstorm, on a rugged mountain path, and encounter a raging flood, what should I do? Shock and tremor are natural reactions, but can we, as children of God, declare by faith that "the Lord sits as king in the flood, and the LORD sits as king for ever." Because we know that God is still in control, we can have peace to face all difficulties.

The decoration of the mind is better than the dress of the body. Outward beauty cannot be matched with holiness of character, and the poet elevates our minds from the earth to heaven by calling angels to praise God. We should know that the storms of nature, the storms of human history, and the storms of our lives are all raised up and used by God, and that every man of God should listen to "the voice of Jehovah" from the storm and give him the glory that Jehovah's name deserves. Therefore, no matter how terrible the circumstances, we can rest assured that it is our Father who raises up the environment, and He wants us to experience God's "strength" to cope with stress and difficulties in the midst of storms, and finally to enjoy God's "blessings of peace" and find rest in Christ.

This poem is like a symphony, played majestically, but ends softly and peacefully; It begins with 'glory to God' (v.1) and ends with 'Peace to men' (v.11). When Christ is born, the angel will once again sing this glorious hymn: "Glory to God in the highest!" Peace on earth to those whom he pleases" peace. This is the most precious gift from Heaven to mankind, and there is no better word in any language than peace. "Though there is a storm of war outside, and the earth is swept away by a strong wind, there is peace in our hearts." The symphony of the psalms ends with the softest of voices, after a deafening crescendo. The Prince of Peace said, "Peace be upon you."

Lord, You are mighty and mighty! We want to give You the glory You deserve and worship You with holy adornment! May we trust in You more firmly every day in our lives to glorify Your name! Full Description

Psalm 29 can be divided into three sections:

Key Verses: Psalm 29:3-9

"The voice of the Lord is over the waters;

the God of glory thunders,

the Lord thunders over the mighty waters.

The voice of the Lord is powerful;

the voice of the Lord is majestic.

The voice of the Lord breaks the cedars;

the Lord breaks in pieces the cedars of Lebanon.

The voice of the Lord strikes with flashes of lightning.

The voice of the Lord shakes the desert;

the Lord shakes the Desert of Kadesh.

The voice of the Lord twists the oaks

and strips the forests bare.

And in his temple all cry, 'Glory!'"

God's Eternal Reign and Blessing (Verses 10-11)

The psalm concludes by emphasizing God's eternal reign and His authority over the floodwaters, which symbolize chaos and destruction. God is depicted as seated "enthroned" forever as the King. He blesses His people with strength and peace. This is a reassurance that God, who controls the forces of nature, also protects and blesses His people.

Key Verses: Psalm 29:10-11

"The Lord sits enthroned over the flood;

the Lord is enthroned as King forever.

The Lord gives strength to his people;

the Lord blesses his people with peace."

Just as God has power over nature, He also offers spiritual strength and peace to His people, enabling them to endure and thrive.

Spiritual Influence: This verse provides comfort for believers, reminding them that God equips His people with what they need—strength to face challenges and peace to overcome anxiety and fear. It also underscores the idea that God's peace is not just the absence of conflict but a deep, inner tranquility that comes from trusting in His sovereignty.
