The special woman in the Bible – Sarah; "Ladies of the world, you don't have
to belittle yourself because of your age."

Each of you has unique values, wisdom, and light. Regardless of age,
background, or experience, you should cherish yourself and bravely live the
beauty and dignity of life.

Sarah is a very special woman in the Bible. She was not only Abraham's wife,
but also an important figure in God's promised covenant. Her life was full of
faith, waiting, and miracles, and she also showed God's power and faithfulness
to future generations.

Eager for infertility, Sarah gave her Egyptian servant Hagar to Abram as a
surrogate. Then comes heartbreak: Hagar is pregnant, pride and jealousy arise,
and Sarah treats Hagar harshly, forcing her to flee into the wilderness.

According to the Book of Genesis, Sarah was about 90 years old when she gave
birth to Isaac. When God reiterated His promise to Abraham, Abraham was 99
years old, and Sarah was about 89 to 90 years old. God promised them a
biological son, which was almost impossible for an elderly couple.

Genesis 21:5 says:

"Abraham was a hundred years old when he had Isaac his son."

Therefore, it can be deduced:

- Abraham was 100 years old
- Sarah was about 90 years old

This incident became one of the most important miracles in the Bible. Because Sarah was already past the normal age of childbearing, God still made her pregnant and gave birth to a child according to His promise.

Genesis 21:1 records:

"And the LORD favored Sarah as he had spoken, and he did to Sarah as he had spoken."

This passage reminds us that what seems impossible to man is possible with God.

In Genesis 20, there is also an event about Abraham, Sarah, and King Abimelech. At that time, Abraham, fearing that his life would be threatened, declared Sarah as his sister, not his wife. King Abimelech thus brought Sarah into the palace, but God personally warned Abimelech in a dream not to violate Sarah and thus protected her.

This happened shortly before Isaac was born, so Sarah was about 89 to 90 years old at that time.

Many people will be surprised when they read this: Why is Sarah, who is nearly 90 years old, still attracting the attention of King Abimelech?

The Bible does not elaborate on why, but many biblical scholars believe that Sarah may still have retained considerable beauty and nobility. However, the real point of this passage is not in her appearance, but in how God Himself kept His promise that Isaac's birth was entirely God's plan.

Sarah's life was not only a life of miracles, but also a testimony of God's faithfulness throughout her life.

According to Genesis 23:1, Sarah died at the age of 127:

"Sarah lived one hundred and twenty-seven years; This is the age of Sarah's life."

She is one of the few female characters in the Bible whose age is explicitly stated. Her life went from waiting for promises to seeing God fulfill them with her own eyes, and she became an example of faith throughout the ages.

Sarah made us understand that God's timing is not wrong, and God's promises will never fail.
